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



Record-Breaking Year With Largest

Cerritos College does it again! We shattered our record, having awarded 6,314 degrees and certificates to the Class of 2023 graduates. That's the highest number in campus history.

Cerritos College is graduating students faster than ever. Over the last five years, we have doubled the number of students completing their studies within two years. Cerritos College Named Champion for Equitable Access for Black Students



The Campaign for College Opportunity honored Cerritos College as a 2023 Champion for excelling in equitable course placement in Black English enrollment. We were commended for our quick implementation of Assembly Bill 705 by enrolling 100 percent of our Black students directly into transfer-level English coursework during the 2021-22 academic year. The landmark AB 705 eliminated developmental English and math courses from community college placement exams.

Over a decade of research has shown that students' likelihood of earning a degree decreases when they start college in remedial courses. Increasing access to transfer-level coursework boosts student success and helps close racial/ethnic equity gaps.

We serve approximately 1,400 students who identify as Black and African American. Compared to 2017, nearly four times as many students complete transfer-level math and English in their first year. According to our research, students who achieve transfer-level math and English earlier in their educational career are graduating faster.

At a Glance

Focused on student development and academic success, Cerritos College offers nearly 300 degrees and certificate programs in nine divisions. The diverse student body is comprised of more than 20,000 students studying in areas such as business; fine arts and communication; liberal arts; kinesiology; health occupations; humanities and social sciences; science, engineering, and mathematics; and technology.

The District encompasses southeastern Los Angeles County communities: Artesia, Bellflower, Cerritos, Downey, Hawaiian Gardens, La Mirada, Norwalk, and portions of Bell Gardens, Lakewood, Long Beach, Santa Fe Springs, and South Gate.







We are thrilled to be among 21 campuses awarded funding from the Governor's Higher Education Student Housing Grant Program. Cerritos College will receive \$68 million to create affordable on-campus student housing. Our Board

of Trustees will also contribute \$12 million. The combined funds will build an \$80-million student housing complex along Studebaker Road featuring approximately 400 affordable beds, communal kitchens, and spaces where tutors and mental health specialists can visit students. The project is part of our ongoing efforts to address the needs of underserved community college students and help them balance the challenges of school and skyrocketing living costs.

Leadership in Sustainability

Cerritos College strives to be an environmental leader. We are creating a campus environment that fosters sustainability through conscious decision-making strategies.



Cerritos College is in the process of installing solar panels to reduce carbon emissions. When completed, solar panels will offset approximately 85% of our energy consumption, saving roughly \$17 million in energy costs over 20 years. Solar panels will be installed as carports in lots 1 and 10. Construction is scheduled to begin in the summer of 2024.



Did you know we offer 12 electric vehicle charging stations for public use on campus? For \$0.36 per kilowatt hour, you can charge your vehicles in our parking lots 2 (currently unavailable due to construction), 4, and 10. Through electric vehicle charging, we have reduced greenhouse gas emissions by 11,254 kilograms (about the weight of a school bus) in three years!

Falcon Women's Wrestling Wins **Inaugural CCCAA State Championship**



When Dustin Kirk was brought in to serve as Cerritos College's firstever women's wrestling head coach, he had five things in mind that he wanted to accomplish: host the first-ever CCCAA dual meet, win their first dual meet, win a tournament, win the CCCAA Team Dual State Championship in the Falcon gym, and win the CCCAA State Championship. In the team's first season, the Falcons accomplished all that, sweeping every award during the season and wrapping things up with a win at the state championships.

Falcons finished with 129 team points and outdistanced second-place Mt. San Antonio College, which scored 110.5 team points. We ended with nine All-American wrestlers, four state champions, and eight members in the top three.

In addition, Kirk (pictured left) was voted the state's Coach of the Year, while freshman 148-pound Aine Drury (pictured below) was named the Most Valuable Wrestler at the state championships. Congratulations, Falcons!

For Coach Kirk, former Falcon wrestling two-time All-American and 133-pound state champion, the next goal is to grow the program, and his sights are set on bringing 30 girls in for next season and working toward another championship.






