To make a document accessible, do the following:

I mages:

- 1. Make sure that all images have alternate text:
 - a. Don't use the words "image of", "picture of", "photo of", "clipart of", "poster of", "painting of", "______ logo", etc. in the alternate text because it is considered a medium description. These words describe the kind of image rather than what is in the image itself. Instead, describe what is in the image. Make sure alternate text is more than 8 characters but less than 80 characters.

For example, in the image below, "Franco the Falcon Mascot walking down the field at graduation, in a cap and gown." should be the appropriate alternate text.

b. For images/logos with text, the text should be the alternate text. For example, the image of the Cerritos College logo should just be "Cerritos College". Do not use the word "logo".




- c. Spell out acronyms. So, for example, the image that shows the "IEW" logo should have alternate text that reads, "International Education Week 2015".
- d. For images that act as a decoration and have no real functionality to the content of the document, the alternate text should be empty double quotations marks, "".Here is a link for reference: http://webaim.org/techniques/alttext/#decorative
- 2. Make sure that all layers are in order of importance. For example, background image should be at the back or first layer (if working in Illustrator/InDesign), then images then text at the top most layer.
- 3. Delete any extra images or layers that are not going to be visible after the flyer is saved. This reduces the chance that Acrobat will find these hidden layers and consider it an image with missing alternate text.
- 4. In most programs, you can click "File" then "Save As" then choose "PDF" then click the "Options" button to see that the option, "Document structure tags for accessibility" is checked. Or you can check your PDF saving options to make sure that "Document structure tags for accessibility" is checked.




Below is how to add alternate text to the images in MS Word 2010. These instructions should be applicable to other Microsoft programs such as Excel, PowerPoint and Publisher:


1. Right click the image to open the short-cut menu. Click on "Format Picture...":




2. Click the "Alt Text" tab and type the appropriate alternate text for that image (see below for 2016 instruction). In this example, since the image is a decorative image, a "" was typed in the alternative text field. Click the "OK" button and repeat step 1 and 2 for each image:




For users of MS Word 2016, click the "Layout & Properties" button on the upper right corner:



Click "Alt text" and provide a description:



Please note, if the image is in the footer area of the file, this step may not need to be repeated for each image. Once you insert the alternate text for one image in the footer area, the alternate text may be inserted for every image in the footer area.



In example below, the alternate text for this image can say something such as, "Cerritos College Student Equity Plan Signature Page"

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
Tables:

Generally speaking, tables should be simple and only be used to show data-type information rather than layout purposes.

Below is an example of a good table setup. Every column should have column header information:


Below is how to add table header row information to the tables in MS Word 2010:

To make sure each table has header rows:


1. Click the "Design" tab under "Table Tools" on the far right:




2. Make sure that "Header" and "First Column" are checked on the far left:



3. Right-click in top row of each table and click "Table Properties":



4. Click the "Row" tab and make sure that the option, "Repeat as header row at the top of each page" is checked:



5. Click the "OK" button.

Please note: Some tables may not have the header text row as in the example above ("Student Outcomes" and "Datasets"). In this case, it would be best to add a table row for the header information. See below:






