Charles Betz wrote that Carol and he recently went to Norway on a cruise. We landed in Copenhagen, spent a night there and enjoyed seeing a little more of the city than we had previously. Bicycles are everywhere! There are even major bridges for pedestrians and bikes! We really enjoyed walking around the city with our hotel as our base.

We boarded the cruise ship and set "sail" for Norway. We had never been there, but had high expectations. It was even better than we had imagined. My previous "best scenery" award had gone to the Faroe Islands. Norway, particularly the fjords, was just as good, but there was MUCH MORE of it.

Rising temperatures provided us with really lovely weather. The rising temperatures of recent years had melted the snow off many glaciers and now the ice of the glaciers is melting and they are shrinking. Norway is very committed to trying to slow global warming. Tesla cars were common. Our one tour guide drove a Tesla S Class and she informed us that electric car owners had toll free parking, free tunnel and road use and zero, or diminished tax rates, on the cars. The Tesla was cheaper to own than an economy gasoline powered car.

The irony is that Norway, traditionally a somewhat poor country, is now rich from off shore oil deposits that they are extracting with great gusto. Incomes, and taxes, are now much higher than ever. No one seems to mind the taxes as they have a great, and much appreciated, health care program and generous retirement program. Public education is very good and continues on to advanced degrees.

In the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries people fled Norway for a better life, now they have many immigrants from around the world. Remember that in the late 19th century and early 20th century immigrants from Norway flocked to the Dakotas and Minnesota and thought they had gone to the promised land! Today in Norway there are even "gypsy" women begging on the street corners! Knowing that the oil will someday run out they have a massive endowment fund for the future as well as a very low birthrate that will not maintain the present population level. The county is quite large, and the current population is only a little over five million.

The mountains and the waterways hamper travel and their current solution is to make tunnels through the mountains and under the water. This greatly speeds up your travel, but at the expense of missing the incredibly beautiful countryside. The engineering of the tunnels, roads and rail lines is very impressive. Small scale agriculture is still widespread but not very profitable. Charity is important, even the wrapping plastic for feed crops comes in various colors, each color represents a different charity supported by buying that particular color of wrapper.

As we went North we crossed the Arctic Circle and experienced a pagan ritual, I'm not sure what purpose it served but it was entertaining. The warm water flowing North along the coast make the climate quite temperate for how far North we ventured. As usual the scenery was spectacular.

Our farthest northern venture was Bodo and Harstad. As we went south we even stopped in Gothenburg, Sweden. This was our second time in Sweden having been in Stockholm on a prior trip.

My economist eyes and mind once more noticed that Sweden has the best maintained window frames I have ever seen. I asked our tour guide if the government inspected the windows and made you maintain them. He assured me they did not do that but they did inspect every house for fire hazards and operational fire extinguishers at least every other year, and in some cases every year.

Our trip ended in Oslo where we stayed on for two additional nights in a very nice new hotel named the Thief. I did not find out why it was so named but our room was very comfortable and to my knowledge we still had everything we came with when we left. A rooftop kitchen and restaurant provided us with a wonderful dinner and lovely view of the city. Oslo was very dramatic, and like Copenhagen it preserves its historic heritage alongside its very modern development.

In June we had gone to a special event in North Carolina at the Biltmore Estate. I read about it as a boy in my Encyclopedia (some of you are grown up enough to remember when that was high concept entertainment) and had always wanted to go. It was built by a Vanderbilt on a 135,000 acre property in the 1880's to 1890's. It is incredible and you really need to see it to appreciate the scope of it. Today it has been cut down to only about 10,000 acres, but it is still impressive. If you go you will need several days to really see the estate and absorb some of the history. The adjacent town of Asheville is quite charming as well. There are nice hotels on site and more in Asheville. If not mistaken, I believe it is still the largest residence in the United States. Vanderbilt descendants still own and operate the property and live on site, but not in the main house which serves as a museum.
