TRANSFER CENTER SERVICES

UNIVERSITY/COLLEGE REPRESENTATIVE VISITS

Meet with representatives from various colleges/universities one-on-one to ask questions about admissions, majors, financial aid, and more. To make an appointment call or drop-in at the Transfer Center. Check the Events link on our website.

UNIVERSITY/COLLEGE FAIRS

Visit with numerous university/college representatives on campus. Refer to page 19 for questions to ask university representatives. Fairs are offered throughout the academic year.

UNIVERSITY/COLLEGE WORKSHOPS

Attend a “Transfer 101-Orientation to the Transfer Admission Process”, “Transfer Admission Guarantee”, and/or “Application Workshop”. All workshops are designed to provide vital information on the transfer process, university academic programs and how to fill out the application and write the personal statement.

THREE-DAY UNIVERSITY TOURS

Every year students are given the opportunity to visit universities in Northern California such as UCB, UCD and UCSC. Transportation and hotel expenses over the 3-day trip are paid for by the college (meals are not included). Spaces are limited and students must complete an application. Check with the Transfer Center for applications.

UNIVERSITY TOURS AND PRESENTATIONS

Join us on a campus tour of local area colleges and universities. Transportation is provided to over a dozen different universities, including UC, CSU, and independent/private colleges. Take advantage of this great opportunity to check out the campus environment, ask your specific questions, and attend workshops.

TRANSFER ADMISSION GUARANTEES (TAGS)/UNIVERSITY PARTNERSHIPS

TAGs, which are available for 6 UCs, 4 private California colleges, 3 out-of-state universities and 35 HBCUs, allow students to guarantee their admission a full term prior to transfer. TRANSFER TUESDAYS (11:30 A.M. - 12:30 P.M.)/WALK-IN WEDNESDAYS (5 P.M. -7 P.M.)

Ask a Transfer Center Counselor quick questions about transfer admissions requirements, procedures, and deadlines (Not available during the summer).

TRANSFER CONFERENCE

Join us for a one-day conference providing students with various workshops including university and student panels. (fall semester)

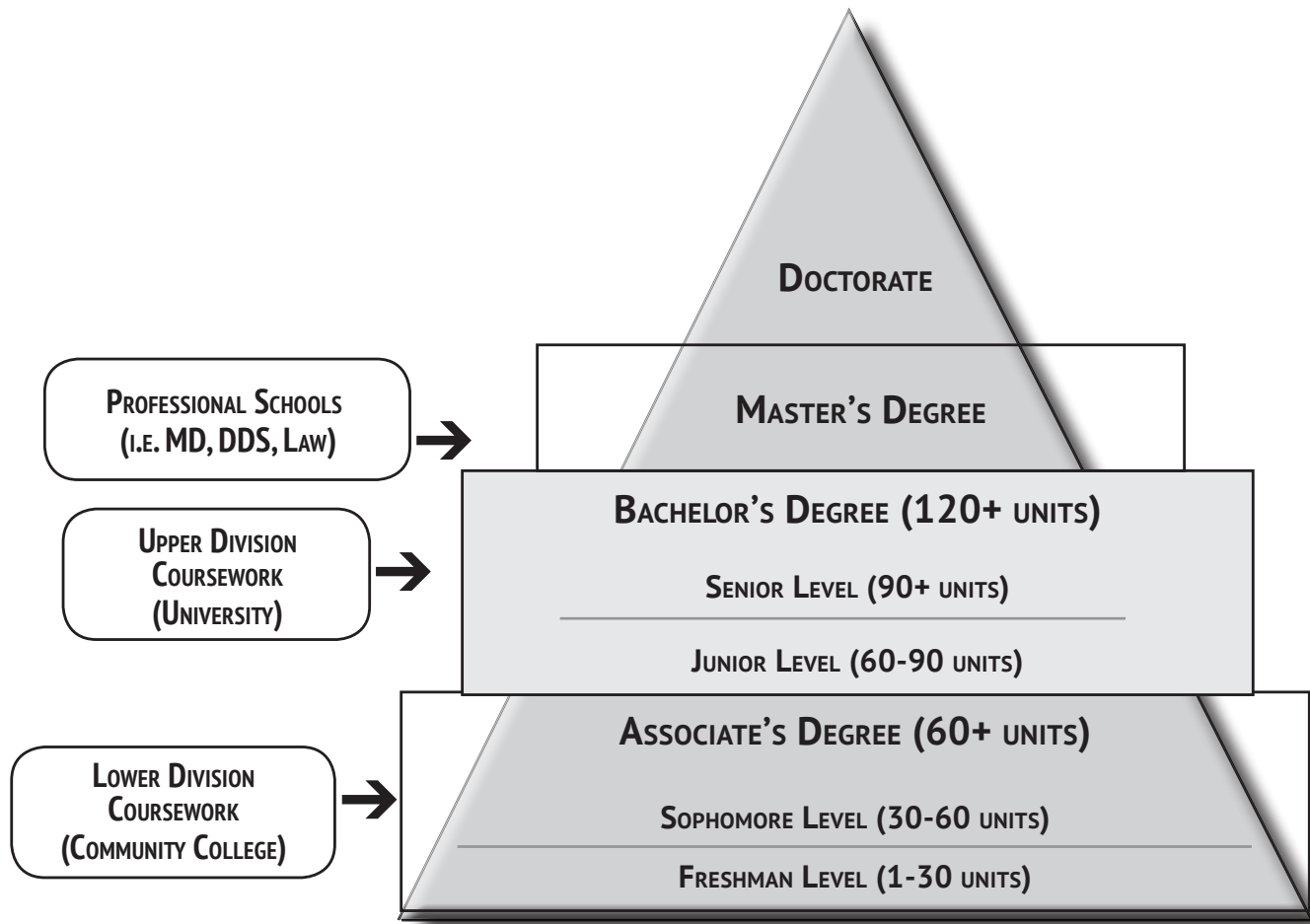
TRANSFER COUNSELING

Student with the goal of transfer to the 4-year university/college can schedule an appointment to research admission requirements, create a comprehensive educational plan, review personal insight questions and/or learn more about TAG opportunities.

STRUCTURE OF HIGHER EDUCATION



Associate's Degree—Major courses plus general education and electives, 60 degree applicable units required. Usually referred to as an AA degree. Normally requires 2 years of full-time study, but may take longer. Offered by community colleges.

Bachelor's Degree—Major plus general education and electives, approximately 120-132 total semester units required. Usually referred to as BA or BS (Bachelor of Art or Science) degree. Normally requires 4-5 years of full-time study. Students may complete the freshman and sophomore years at the community college (as shown above) and then transfer to a 4-year university for the junior and senior level courses.

Master's Degree—Bachelor's degree plus graduate courses in a specialized area. Masters is usually 26-56 units over the bachelor's depending on major. Usually referred to as MA or MS (Masters of Arts or Science). Normally requires 2 additional years of full-time study after completion of bachelor's.

Doctorate Degree—Advanced training beyond bachelor's or master's degree. Units vary depending on field of study. It usually takes 4-5 years of full-time study.

UNDERSTANDING THE TRANSFER BASICS

Lower Division Coursework: Defined as freshman and sophomore level coursework.

Upper Division Coursework: Defined as junior and senior level coursework.

Transfer Student: A student who will have the required minimum number of transferable units and appropriate course patterns completed. Admissions will be based on college work only. (Check with individual campuses regarding lower division classification and appropriate requirements). Meet with a counselor to set up an educational plan, as competitive as possible for admission into your university of choice.

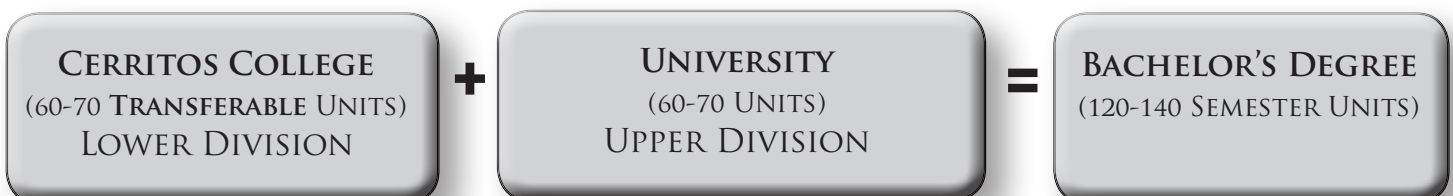

CSU ADMISSIONS CHECKLIST

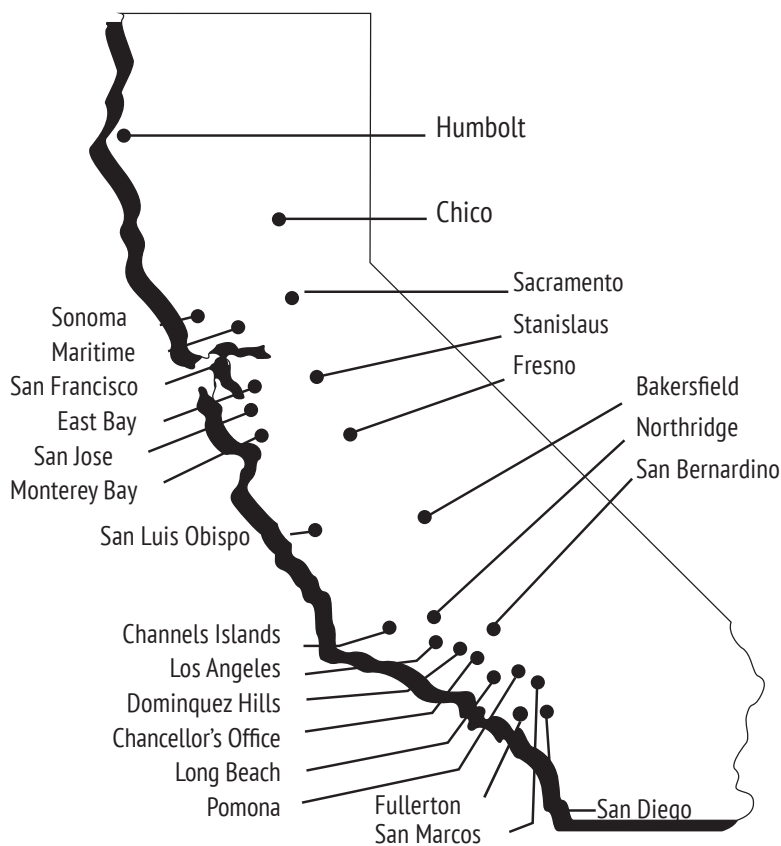
Due to the California state budget, the CSU campuses are becoming increasingly competitive for admissions selection. It is extremely important that you stay current on admission practices for your school of choice, in addition to the following checklist below. Admission practices can change mid-year without prior notification. Please contact a university representative or a Transfer Center counselor for more information.

- __1. Review your academic records with a Cerritos counselor **AND** a university representative to determine your eligibility and competitiveness as a transfer applicant. Follow an educational plan.
- __2. Find out if the CSU campus and major you are interested in is impacted. If so, find out what the admissions requirements are and when they should be completed, i.e., grade point average, major courses required and any other supplemental materials such as portfolios, interviews or letters of recommendation.
- __3. Take courses for your major, especially if your major is impacted.
- __4. Learn more about A Degree with a Guarantee (see Page 20).
- __5. Find out which general education pattern is appropriate for your campus and/or major choice. In general, the CSU general education pattern (plan B) is preferred, but there are some prominent exceptions.
- __6. Do not delay taking your transfer Math, English Composition, Critical Thinking and Speech courses (“The Golden Four”).
- __7. If you took AP exams in high school and received a score of 3 or higher, ask a counselor for a CSU evaluation of those scores. Cerritos evaluates AP scores differently than CSU campuses.
- __8. Inquire about the benefits of joining the Scholars’ Honors Program (SHP).
- __9. Visit the CSU campus you are interested in attending. Inquire about university tours at the Transfer Center.
- __10. Apply broadly. Don’t put all of your eggs in one basket. Apply to at least one non-impacted campus if your first choice campus is impacted. Consider listing an alternate major, if your first choice major is impacted. Apply on time and observe all of the important application filing deadlines. Some CSU campuses don’t accept applications in the winter quarter/ spring semester.
- __11. Meet with the Transfer Center counselor. Attend admissions and application workshops. Go to the Transfer Center website for dates and times. www.cerritos.edu/transfer.
- __12. Check and read all emails sent from the university. Make sure you follow up on any additional requirements like completing Supplemental Applications and sending official transcript by specified deadlines.

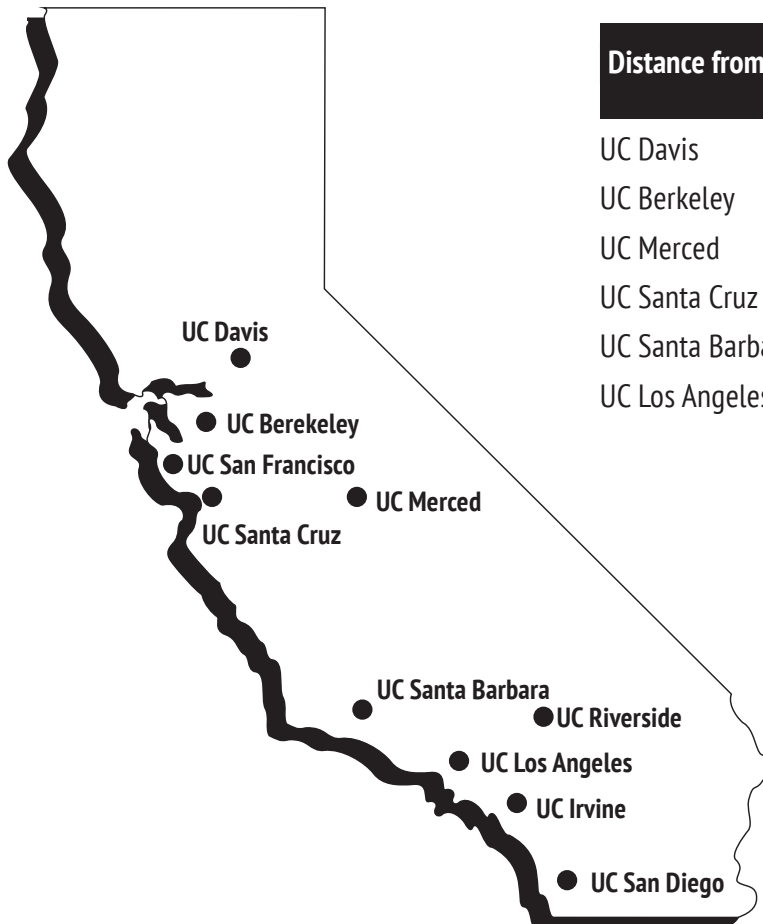

UC ADMISSIONS CHECKLIST

- __1. Review your academic records with a Cerritos counselor **AND** a university representative to determine your eligibility and competitiveness as a transfer applicant. Follow an educational plan.
- __2. Find out if the UC campus and major you are interested in is highly selective. If so, find out what the admissions requirements are and when they should be completed, i.e., grade point average, major courses required and any other supplemental materials such as portfolios, interviews or letters of recommendation.
- __3. Take courses for your major early. The more courses you complete at the time of application, the more competitive you become.
- __4. Find out which general education pattern is appropriate for your campus and/or major choice. In general, IGETC (plan C) is preferred, but there are some prominent exceptions.
- __5. Do not delay taking your transfer Math and English courses.
- __6. If you took AP exams in high school and received a score of 3 or higher, ask a counselor for a UC evaluation of those scores. Cerritos evaluates AP scores differently than UC campuses.
- __7. Keep track of your progress towards admissions on the Transfer Admission Planner: <https://uctap.universityofcalifornia.edu>
- __8. Inquire about Transfer Admissions Guarantee (TAG) programs with some UC campuses. Check with the Transfer Center for a TAG workshop schedule. Inquire about the TAP Program w/ UCLA and UC Berkeley.
- __9. Inquire about the benefits of joining the Scholars' Honors Program (SHP).
- __10. Apply broadly. Don't put all of your eggs in one basket. Apply to at least 3 campuses. Apply on time and observe all of the important application filing deadlines. Most UC campuses accept applications only in the Fall semester/quarter. You must apply a year before the intended transfer term.
- __11. Meet with the Transfer Center counselor. Attend admissions and application/personal insight questions workshops.
- __12. Check and read all emails sent from the university. Make sure you follow up on any additional requirements like completing Supplemental Applications and sending official transcript by specified deadlines.

UC PERSONAL INSIGHT QUESTIONS

The personal insight questions are an important part of your application. There are limitations to what grades and test scores can tell universities about you. The university uses your response to the questions to learn more about you as an individual -- your talents, experiences, achievements and points of view. Think of the personal insight questions as your opportunity to introduce yourself to the admissions officers and faculty who will be evaluating your application. What would you like them to know about you that may not be evident from a review of the rest of your application?

When you use the PATHWAYS electronic application, there will be separate entry boxes for each question and a word counter to help applicants track the length of their responses. Because of the 30-minute time limit in place on each page of the application, it is advised that you **DO NOT** compose your answers on the electronic application. Compose and save them using a word processing program, then copy and paste them in the appropriate entry boxes. Proofread your personal statement very carefully.

Instructions:

There is one required question you must answer. You must also answer 3 out of 7 additional questions. Each response is limited to a maximum of 350 words. Which three questions you choose to answer are up to you, but you should select questions that are most relevant to your experience and that best reflect your individual circumstances.

Required question - Please describe how you have prepared for your intended major, including your readiness to succeed in your upper-division courses once you enroll at the university.

Choose to answer any three of the following seven questions:

1. Describe an example of your leadership experience in which you have positively influenced others, helped resolve disputes, or contributed to group efforts over time.
2. Every person has a creative side, and it can be expressed in many ways: problem solving, original and innovative thinking, and artistically, to name a few. Describe how you express your creative side.
2. What would you say is your greatest talent or skill? How have you developed and demonstrated that talent over time?
4. Describe how you have taken advantage of a significant educational opportunity or worked to overcome an educational barrier you have faced.
5. Describe the most significant challenge you have faced and the steps you have taken to overcome this challenge. How has this challenge affected your academic achievement?
6. What have you done to make your school or your community a better place?
7. What is the one thing that you think sets you apart from other candidates applying to the University of California?

Keep in mind

All questions are equal: All questions are given equal consideration in the application review process, which means there is no advantage or disadvantage to choosing certain questions over others. There is no right or wrong way to answer these questions: It's about getting to know your personality, background, interests and achievements in your own unique voice.

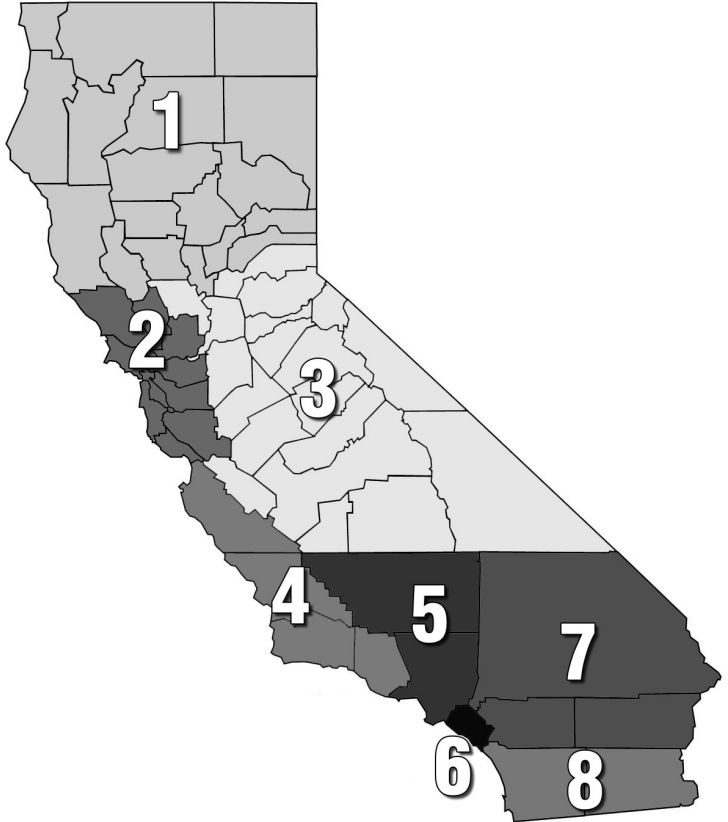

ELIGIBILITY FOR ABOVE IDENTIFIED HBCU'S:

First Option (guaranteed Junior Standing)

- Obtain a transfer-level associate degree with a GPA of 2.5 or higher
- Complete either the University of California General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC), or the California State University General Education Breadth Pattern (CSU GE)

OR

Second Option

- Earn 30 or more CSU or UC transferable units with a GPA of 2.5 or higher

Other advantages conferred to transfer students under the agreement include priority consideration for housing, consideration for transfer scholarships for students with a 3.2 or higher GPA, and pre-admission advising.

For certain majors, students may need to fulfill additional prerequisites and other requirements.

Eight of the participating colleges and universities are private institutions. Lincoln University of Missouri is public, and will offer in-state tuition for California community college transfer students.

OUT-OF-STATE UNIVERSITIES – MINIMUM QUALIFICATIONS:

WESTERN OREGON UNIVERSITY

- Cumulative GPA of 2.25 or higher
- Completion of 24 semester credits. No more than four PE or non-academic elective credits will be counted toward the 24 semester units.
- Completion of English 100 with a C- or higher
- Completion of Math 112 or higher transferable math course with a C- or higher

NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY

- Earned a minimum of 35 credits and the California IGETC with a cumulative GPA of 2.5
- Earned an Associate's degree with a cumulative GPA of 2.0

ARIZONA STATE UNIVERSITY

- High school diploma or a GED with a score of 500 or more, plus one of the following:
- 24 college-level (non-remedial) transferable hours with a 3.0 or higher cumulative transfer GPA (4.00 = A) or
- An Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC), or California State University General Education (CSU GE) with a minimum 2.50 cumulative transfer GPA
- An associate degree with a 2.50 or higher GPA (high school diploma or GED waived)

OR

TRANSFER ADMISSION GUARANTEES (TAG)

The Transfer Admission Guarantee program offers guaranteed admission to students who complete a core set of courses at a California Community College a full term prior to transferring.

(AP units can be used)

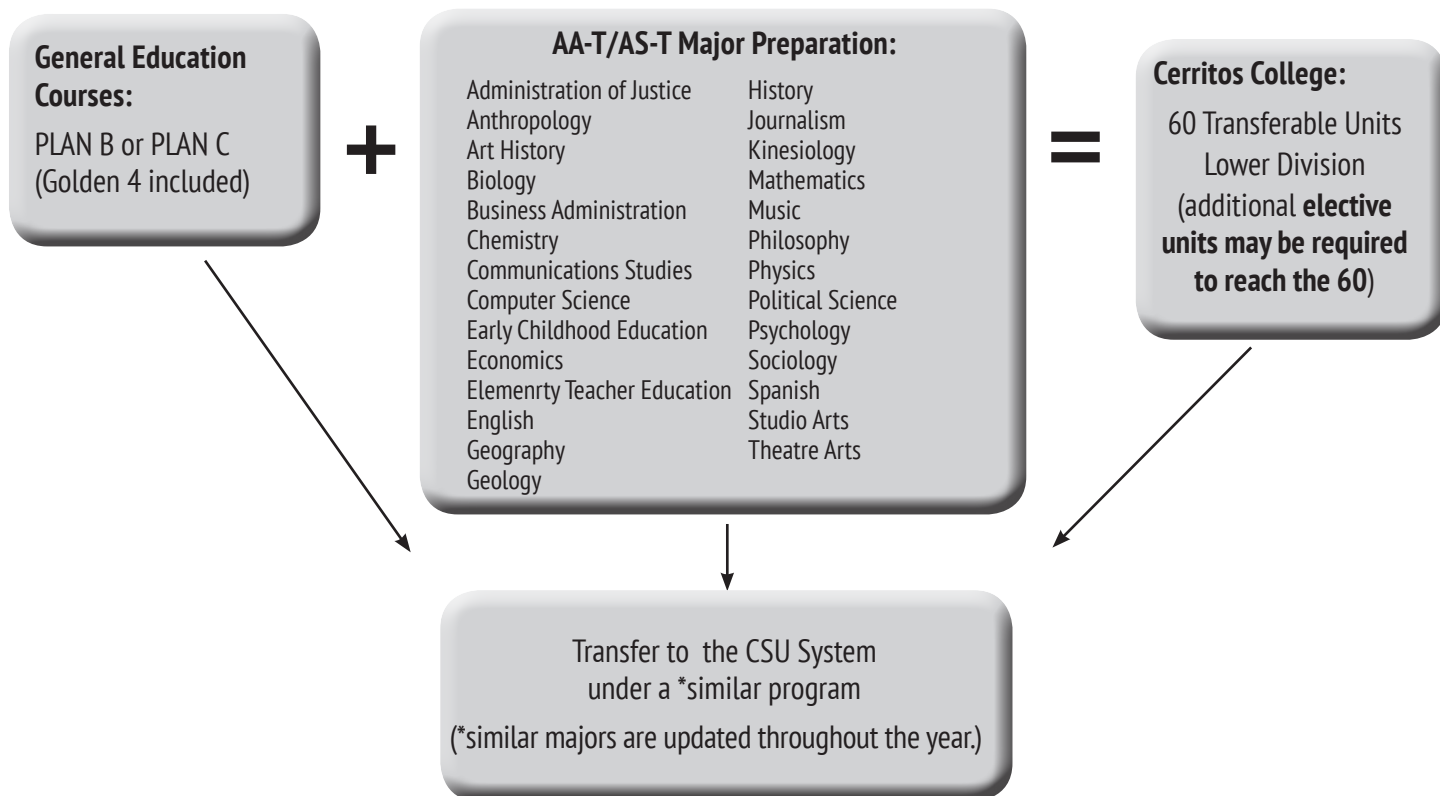

CSU PATHWAY

Students are given guaranteed admission into the California State University (CSU) system, and further are given priority consideration when applying to a particular program that is **similar** to the student's community college major. Students must have 100% completion of the following components. **60 units + 60 units = YOUR BACHELOR'S DEGREE**

Program Impacted: additional .10 GPA index point

Campus & Program Impacted: additional .10 GPA index point

CALCULATING THE TRANSFERABLE GPA

Step 1 – Obtain a copy of your transcripts from all colleges attended; line out the classes that are not transferable (refer to the Cerritos General Catalog to find out what classes are transferable or go to the Assist website www.assist.org). For instructions on how to use the Assist website go to page 18.

Step 2 – Add up the units attempted for each class and the grade points for those classes listed. Grade points are calculated by multiplying units attempted by the grade point value for the grade received in each class.

A=4 / B= 3 / C=2 / D=1 / F=0

When calculating GPA, a unit attempted is a course in which a grade of A, B, C, D, or F has been earned.

Step 3 – Once you have added all the units attempted and the grade points, compute your GPA by dividing the number of grade points by units attempted.

In the example above there are only 9 transferable units and 24 transferable grade points. Grade points were computed by multiplying the number of units that the class is worth times the number of assigned letter grade points. To compute the transferable GPA you must divide total transferable grade points by total transferable units. Therefore, the Transferable GPA is:

$$\text{Example: } 24 / 9 = 2.67$$

$$\text{Total Transferable Grade Points} \div \text{Total Transferable Units Attempted} = \text{Transferable GPA}$$

Repeat – Couse repetition allows such courses for which only substandard work has been recorded, to be repeated only once. The previous grade and units willll be disregarded in the computation of Cerritos College GPA.

Academic Renewal – A procedure that permits alleviation of previously recorded substandard (“D” and “F”) academic performance which is not reflective of a student’s present demonstrated ability. At least 24 units of college work from an accredited institution with a GPA of 2.0 must be completed after the cousework to be alleviated. See a counselor for more information.

Note: Pass/No Pass, Credit/No Credit, Incompletes and/or withdrawels are not calculated in your GPA.

Articulation: Articulation agreements are formal agreements between two campuses. They define how courses taken at one college or university can be used to satisfy a subject matter requirement at another college or university, usually looking from California community college to California public 4-year universities. To see articulation agreements, start by choosing a college or university.

USING ASSIST

There are many ways to use ASSIST.

1. You can use **ASSIST** to find community college courses that are transferable to a UC or CSU campus and how those courses might be used to satisfy specific subject matter requirements for admissions, General Education, or lower division major preparation with California public universities.

How to Use ASSIST:

 - Search for your major by area of study or type your major directly into the box
 - Results from CSU/UC will appear

INDEPENDENT AND OUT-OF-STATE COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES

TRANSFER REQUIREMENTS

There are many choices for transfer students when deciding to earn a bachelor's degree and beyond. In addition to the California State University and University of California systems, there are many California independent institutions. There are also many colleges, private and public, located throughout the United States to which Cerritos College students can transfer. Each of these institutions has its own unique requirements for admission. In order to determine eligibility, students should refer to the school's catalog or website and consult with a counselor at Cerritos College and/or the university of choice. Please refer to the Private and Out of State Transfer (Post) Guide for further information.

GENERAL EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS FOR INDEPENDENT AND OUT-OF-STATE COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES

In planning for transfer, students should consider the general education requirements for all institutions of interest. Many in-state independent institutions accept CSU General Education and IGETC. Students transferring to independent or out-of-state institutions should refer to the school's catalog or website and meet with a counselor in order to determine appropriate general education requirements. Cerritos College has articulated general education requirements with a number of independent institutions. Submit Documents

Lifetime Limits on Pell Grant – “The 600% Rule”

The amount of Federal Pell Grant funds you receive over your lifetime is limited by federal law to 12 semesters or the equivalent of six full-time years of Pell-Grant Funding

Subsidized Usage Limit Applies (SULA) – “150% Loan Subsidy Rule”

Subsidized loans now have a limit as to how long a student can receive subsidized loans. Students must complete their program within 150% of the published program's required units. If the student fails to complete their program within that time frame, they will lose the subsidy on all subsidized loans from that point forward. Loss of subsidy means that interest will start to accrue on the loan.

Note: This only applies to new borrowers as of Fall 2013

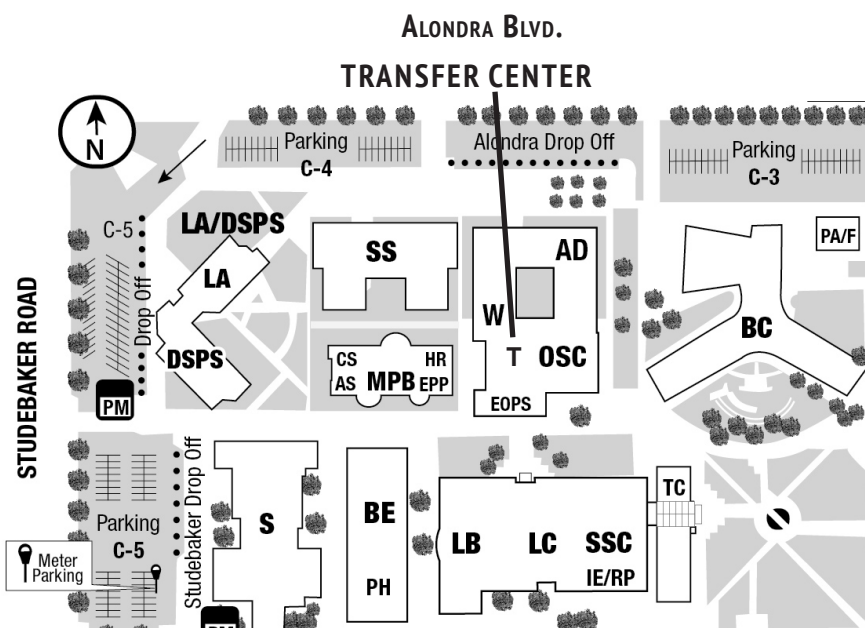
