- 6 >> Present.
- 7 >> Marisa Perez.
- 8 >> Present.
- 9 >> Member Carmen Avalos.
- 10 >> Present.
- 11 >> Sandra Salazar is absent.
- 12 Student Trustee Raul Avalos.
- 13 >> Present
- 14 >> And President Superintendent
- 15 Dr. Fierro.
- 16 >> Present
- 17 >> President Lewis: And let
- 18 the record reflect that
- 19 Dr. Salazar is not absent.
- 20 She's right here. Before public
- 21 comments we will go to the

- 9 >> Carmen Avalos I'm sorry.
- 10 Hold on, so quick question --
- 11 I'm sorry, in the close session
- 12 what time are we going into
- 13 close session?
- 14 >> President Lewis: No later
- 15 than 9:00 o'clock.
- 16 >> Carmen Avalos: I would
- 17 like to request that we go in at
- 18 8:30 p.m.
- 19 >> President Lewis: Any
- 20 objection? Seeing none that is

- 21 fine.
- 22 >> Carmen Avalos: Thank you.
- 23 >> President Lewis: We will
- 24 go into public comments and from
- 25 Norma Rodriguez for an

- 1 invitation for a international
- 2 student graduation.
- 3 >> Well, good evening and Dr.
- 4 Fierro and esteemed members of
- 5 the board and campus leaders and
- 6 I'm the Director of the Cal
- 7 Works and International Student
- 8 Services and we are delighted to
- 9 be here tonight. I am not here
- 10 by myself but with my team.
- 11 [Applause]
- 12 >> So dear honored guests we
- 13 know that there's no time for a
- 14 siesta because we're having a
- 15 graduation fiesta and please
- 16 join us celebrating our work and
- 17 international student class of
- 18 2018. We will be having our

19 graduation Friday in the student center from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. and we hope that you can make it to celebrate our students. [Applause] 24 >> President Lewis: Thank Sample footer 1 you. 2 >> So these are candies so you can break them to open them up and eat the goodies inside. Enjoy. >> President Lewis: Thank you [Applause] >> It's like getting a 9 telegram but not. Next we will have a David Ramirez who is the current Vice President of ASCC. 12 Is David here? >> He's not here at the 13 14 moment. >> President Lewis: I will 15 16 save him for the end. Next we go to Stephanie Rosenblatt on

- 18 Item 17 when is a potential19 contract with National20 University.
- 21 >> Hello. So the first thing
- 22 I want to make clear I am
- 23 speaking as myself an individual
- 24 not a representative of the
- 25 Faculty Federation. I am a

- 1 librarian here at the college.
- 2 I have questions about Item 17.
- 3 You can see I'm not opposed or
- 4 for but I have some concerns so
- 5 it's a potential contract
- 6 between the district and
- 7 National University and it's
- 8 being entered into so we can
- 9 offer bachelor programs in
- 10 paralegal on campus and it's a
- 11 condition of the contract that
- 12 they will be paying the campus
- 13 \$25 per course using our
- 14 facilities, so I have spoken to
- 15 Bruce Greenberg who is the Chair

- 16 of Paralegal and told me they're17 the only institution we can have18 this kind of arrangement with
 - 19 that there are no public
- 20 universities that offer
- 21 paralegal anywhere near us and
- 22 none were interested in having
- 23 that relationship us and under
- 24 those conditions it seems
- 25 reasonable to me we would enter

- 1 this kind of arrangement. My
- 2 concerns are I feel like in some
- 3 ways we're entering on a
- 4 slippery slope and privatizing
- 5 public education by subsidizing
- 6 a private company by a how long
- 7 them to use our facilities for
- 8 such an inexpensive price and I
- 9 understand in return our
- 10 students get a reduction in the
- 11 tuition to make it comparable to
- 12 a Cal State but I would like to
- 13 hear from the board some type of
- 14 statement before we pursue any

- 15 arrangements in the future that
- 16 we do look for partners that
- 17 come from the Cal State or the
- 18 UCs or other public educational
- 19 body because we do -- we are
- 20 using public funds and we hear a
- 21 lot about our campus being
- 22 impacted but we have to worry
- 23 about scheduling and I am sure
- 24 that due diligence was done in
- 25 this situation but I don't know

- 1 that because even though I'm on
- 2 the Coordinating Committee this
- 3 agenda item didn't show up on
- 4 the agenda and this item wasn't
- 5 on it so none of the campus
- 6 constituent groups had time to
- 7 ask questions about this item so
- 8 I'm asking the board to consider
- 9 in the future making sure that
- 10 due diligence is done that that
- 11 we prioritize partnerships with
- 12 other public institutions.

- 13 Thank you.14 [Applause]15 >> Preside16 Dad Sabo re
 - >> President Lewis: Next is
 - 16 Dad Sabo regarding the impact of
 - 17 full time hiring freeze on
- 18 student access to these courses.
- 19 >> Yes, I'm a professor --
- 20 [Off Mic] there we go. Okay.
- 21 Technical matters. I can handle
- 22 those. Yes, I am really
- 23 concerned about the hiring
- 24 freeze. Our department is
- 25 currently four full time faculty

- 1 members, myself, Janet, our most
- 2 Outstanding Faculty of the Year
- 3 Carlos and Jim. Jim is retiring
- 4 next month -- I guess this
- 5 month. It's May already. Okay.
- 6 All of us teach seven or
- 7 sometimes eight classes a
- 8 semester without exception.
- 9 With the hiring freeze and Jim
- 10 retiring we do not have a way of
- 11 replacing someone to teach those

- 12 seven or eight student units or
- 13 classes that he teaches. The
- 14 big problem here is that they're
- 15 an enormous majors here on
- 16 campus that require physics in
- 17 order to have their degree.
- 18 Physics majors, engineer majors,
- 19 chemistry, Biology, math majors,
- 20 Kinesiology, computer science,
- 21 aerospace and mechanical
- 22 specialty, the list goes on. I
- 23 mean there's a list of something
- 24 about 20 or so majors, Zoology,
- 25 pre-chiropractor and Pre-Med and

- 1 pre-pharmacy and all have to
- 2 take physics. We will be down
- 3 to three full time professors
- 4 come this fall. Janet had
- 5 looked through data in a recent
- 6 semester so the introductory
- 7 classes are physics 100 or 101.
- 8 201 is the next class and all of
- 9 the ones the majors I listed

- 10 first require 201, again math, chemistry, bio, computer science. 2/3 of the science 13
 - that took physics 100 or 101 who
 - passed -- we're not talking
 - about students withdrew or
 - didn't finish and 2/3s that
 - passed couldn't get a seat the 17
 - following semester in 201 and
 - this is under current conditions 19
 - 20 and not with the professor
 - retiring. We have a limited
 - pool of part timers to hire and
 - can't pick up all of his classes
 - 24 and if you instruct me on this
 - 25 soon community colleges are

- based on metrics how many
- students graduate and proceed to
- the four year school and is that
- correct? And the time frame is
- three years if I remember
- correctly. They're still
- 7 negotiating it. None of the
- students looking to complete the

9 majors can graduate in that time 10 frame because 2/3 can't get the

next classes under current

- 12 conditions. We don't find
- 13 qualified adjunct teachers for
- 14 these classes. We need to hire
- 15 another full time professor and
- 16 not three of us at seven or
- 17 eight classes a semester to
- 18 serve the students. This is a
- 19 disservice to the students. It
- 20 lengthens the time they are here
- 21 and will affect the college
- 22 negatively if we're judged how
- 23 many we transfer at one time and
- 24 already doing that and we hear
- 25 that the students will go to

- 1 other surrounding colleges to
- 2 complete the requirements.
- 3 They're FTES we're currently
- 4 losing and not even when we go
- 5 down to three full timers.
- 6 Please consider lifting the

- 7 hiring freeze for our
- 8 departments so we can serve our
- 9 students as well they deserved
- 10 to be served. They're the best
- 11 students. They put in extra
- 12 hours for the classes in all of
- 13 these subjects. Please serve
- 14 them well and allow us to hire
- 15 another person of the caliber of
- 16 Janet -- I don't know about
- 17 myself so that we can serve our
- 18 students well. Thank you.
- 19 [Applause]
- 20 >> President Lewis: Thank
- 21 you. Next we have three cards
- 22 on the same issue regarding part
- 23 time faculty so we will start
- 24 with George Jarett.
- 25 >> Thank you. I am actually

- 1 speaking on behalf of a faculty
- 2 colleague who is not able to be
- 3 here tonight and wrote his
- 4 statement for us to read in the
- 5 first person so you will forgive

- 6 me I am talking about something
- 7 not my experience but his "my
- 8 name is John Garcia and adjunct
- 9 in the English Department and
- 10 worked at Cerritos College for
- 11 four years and work at ABC
- 12 Unified as a substitute to make
- 13 ends movement I have lung
- 14 conditions and asthma and COPD
- 15 and makes it difficult to
- 16 breathe or talk or function when
- 17 I'm not on my medication. I
- 18 have to regularly see a doctor
- 19 and lung specialist in addition
- 20 to the regular doctor. The
- 21 health care I can't afford
- 22 reduces the cost of medication
- 23 and co-pays for doctor visits
- 24 but the cost is expensive for
- 25 someone like me that makes just

- 1 \$3,100 a month and the
- 2 medications cost a lot of month
- 3 and I see the doctors every

- 4 month and co-pays are \$300 a
- 5 month. In total my medical
- 6 costs are almost 500 every month
- 7 and this is quite an expense for
- 8 someone who makes a little over
- 9 \$30,000 a year. To avoid the
- 10 high cost of prescriptions I
- 11 spread out the medications to
- 12 last longer and one month lasts
- 13 two and some times I don't take
- 14 them at all. They're meant to
- 15 be taken everyday to maintain my
- 16 health however I can't afford to
- 17 do this. If I were to receive
- 18 employer provided health care I
- 19 could have access to the
- 20 medications that keep me life
- 21 and my doctors my condition
- 22 won't improve but if I take the
- 23 medication as prepared my
- 24 condition will not worsen.
- 25 Thank you.

- 1 [Applause]
- 2 >> President Lewis: Walter

- 3 Fernandez.
- 4 >> Hi. I don't know how well
- 5 you can hear me because I have
- 6 been under the weather as you
- 7 can tell and working all day
- 8 today so let's see how I do.
- 9 Honorable Trustees I come before
- 10 you to raise the issue of just
- 11 compensation for the faculty,
- 12 all faculty. That means our
- 13 colleagues of the adjunct staff
- 14 whose compensation ought to be
- 15 improved. Having served as
- 16 Department Chair man I recall
- 17 several instances in which
- 18 excellent instructors turn down
- 19 classes because one another
- 20 college paid more per hour
- 21 and/or they received health
- 22 benefits at another campus like
- 23 Santa Monica, Rio Honda,
- 24 Glendale, citrus, Long Beach and
- 25 chaffy. Who stood to surf? Our

- 1 students. Who else? The
- 2 adjunct instructors who prefer
- 3 to teach at Cerritos due to the
- 4 welcoming working environment
- 5 provided by colleagues and
- 6 support staff and most
- 7 importantly our students. What
- 8 else gets hurt? Well not in the
- 9 case of my department which
- 10 fortunately found good
- 11 replacement staff but consider
- 12 the impact it could have on the
- 13 quality and consistency of a
- 14 program keeping quality adjunct
- 15 staff means good compensation.
- 16 One of our colleagues is
- 17 currently conducting a study to
- 18 support the hypothesis that
- 19 adjuncts teaching is a way for
- 20 minority groups into the full
- 21 time ranks. Keeping adjunct
- 22 staff might contribute to
- 23 greater diversity in the full
- 24 time ranks. Therefore be
- 25 mindful of these points and

- 1 provide fair competitive
- 2 compensation and benefits to
- 3 this staff CCFF has a clear
- 4 sense of the budget and they
- 5 know it and wouldn't negotiate
- 6 something the college couldn't
- 7 afford. Listen to them. Also
- 8 this faculty is united. It has
- 9 experience. It is resolved to
- 10 accept only the fairest
- 11 arrangement with this district,
- 12 an arrangement that includes
- 13 competitive compensation for the
- 14 adjunct staff. Ladies and
- 15 gentlemen anything else is
- 16 counter productive to the
- 17 mission of this college so
- 18 therefore please consider the
- 19 matter carefully. Thank you.
- 20 >> President Lewis: Bobby Lee
- 21 Smart.
- 22 >> I'm a little shorter than
- 23 everyone else so good evening.
- 24 I am here to speak about part
- 25 time issues and we've heard a

- 1 couple people speak about the
- 2 importance of full time hires
- 3 and adjunct faculty and finding
- 4 qualified staff. Last Monday I
- 5 was able to sit in for Stephanie
- 6 and had Tom Epstein and the
- 7 current Board of Governors Vice
- 8 President and will be the
- 9 President in the next year. I
- 10 asked him about his thoughts on
- 11 adjunct faculty and how we
- 12 impact students because they
- 13 were talking about student
- 14 success. He said "We need to
- 15 make it better. He said
- 16 teaching multiple classes on
- 17 multiple campuses is not good
- 18 for the faculty and have
- 19 negative impact for students."
- 20 I have many different students
- 21 on different campuses and how
- 22 are we serving the students that
- 23 way? He said "Every time they
- 24 asked for more funding for

- 1 faculty and we proposed that in
- 2 negotiations. He said students
- are complaining for full time
- 4 and part time. He said that
- 5 students complain about having
- 6 lack of access to the adjunct
- 7 professors. He said there needs
- 8 to be more office hours and
- 9 space for that. We propose
- 10 that. He said benefits for part
- 11 time and full time should be
- 12 equal and equal pay for equal
- 13 work. We proposed a move to
- 14 this model. We proposed this
- 15 model in our negotiations. We
- 16 proposed health care and it's
- 17 important and if we're unhealthy
- 18 we can't be good for the
- 19 students so we proposed access
- 20 for the part timers. Hold on.
- 21 Sorry. Yes this will cost money
- 22 and while the district stated
- 23 they have about \$28 million in

- 24 reserves we assert it's closer
- 25 to much more and the state says

- 1 it's \$5 million and either way
- 2 there is money to work on these
- 3 issues and better pay for part
- 4 timers. The argument is always
- 5 about what other other campuses
- 6 doing? What are they doing over
- 7 there? Guess what? Most have
- 8 models of pay parity and more
- 9 faculty and more office hours
- 10 than we do. Cerritos College
- 11 needs to stop citing these
- 12 things and improve the lives of
- 13 the faculty as Tom Epstein
- 14 suggested. Thank you. President
- 15 Lewis: Regarding the ASCC
- 16 2018-19 budget Senator Espayo.
- 17 >> Good afternoon Board
- 18 Members, members of the public,
- 19 students, faculty, constituents,
- 20 everything -- all of you. I
- 21 would like to give a round of

- 22 hand of applause to the fellow
- 23 constituents for approving the
- 24 2018-19 budget.
- 25 [Applause]

- 1 >> It took a lot of hard work
- 2 and diligence and it just turned
- 3 out to be a good turn out and I
- 4 am very excited for this next
- 5 coming up year. I will be
- 6 serving as a Senator again so I
- 7 hope to make a difference in
- 8 students' lives and I would like
- 9 to say from my point of view as
- 10 a student I am also for the
- 11 adjunct staffing. I do believe
- 12 like my professor it is these
- 13 faculty they're very vital to
- 14 us. I wouldn't be where I am as
- 15 a student leader if it wasn't
- 16 for them. I aspire to be like
- 17 the Norwalk Mayor Jennifer Lopez
- 18 and Vice Mayor Margarita Rios
- 19 and they inspired to me take
- 20 positions as them. They used to

- 21 be Cerritos College students.
- 22 If they're there I can be too so
- 23 I urge you to please keep the
- 24 staff. They're vital. They're
- 25 necessary and yeah and I hope

- 1 the Board of Trustees can keep
- 2 these beautiful people and the
- 3 power to the students.
- 4 [Applause]
- 5 >> President Lewis: David
- 6 Ramirez.
- 7 >> Hey everyone sorry for
- 8 being late. I couldn't leave
- 9 without my exam back. I got an
- 10 "A" On my exam by the way and I
- 11 I'm a good student and hopefully
- 12 translates to be a good leader
- 13 too. This is hard to talk about
- 14 and I talk fast and cold with
- 15 things and it's what the data
- 16 says and sometimes it misses
- 17 things and misses the human
- 18 element of everything. I come

19 as a Cerritos College student 20 and not President of the STEM club. I came to Cerritos College in 2009. I started the automotive program here. I failed. I made it through a 25 year of the program and I ended Sample footer 1 up leaving Cerritos College and 2 participating in activities which many would frown upon. I decided that Cerritos College or college wasn't where I wanted to be at. I needed to experience life and make money and out there and enjoy the quick money and luxuries of life. I participated in this lifestyle 11 for two, three years before I found myself looking at the 12 bottom of a beer bottle and 13 saying I need to go back to college and do something with my

life. I had conversations with

my best friend Bobby and sit in

- 18 the car dude we need to go back
- 19 to college. We need to go back
- 20 to college so I came back to
- 21 Cerritos College. Good news and
- 22 I came with the mentality it
- 23 might be hard but I will do it.
- 24 I will do whatever it takes to
- 25 make an impact on society, and I

- 1 get told by students "hey you're
- 2 crazy. Why are you going to the
- 3 board meetings. They're not
- 4 going to listen to you and
- 5 politics is here and that hung
- 6 on to me. That hung on to me
- 7 and it might be crazy ideas and
- 8 let's remove the hiring freeze
- 9 and get the part timers who have
- 10 done beyond measure to do the
- 11 duties to the college and give
- 12 them a full time position, and I
- 13 understand it's not as easy as
- 14 saying that. I understand it's
- 15 not easy. I understand there

- 16 processes and faculty processes17 and a lot of bureaucracy that18 goes into it but let's get the
 - 19 conversation started. I'm also
- 20 a first generation college
- 21 student. My parents didn't have
- 22 the luxury of going to college
- 23 or how it works, what programs
- 24 to get into or what activities
- 25 to get involved into and I

- 1 didn't know about ASCC and I
- 2 didn't know about the honors
- 3 program and it's too late but I
- 4 didn't know about it. I was
- 5 here for such a long time
- 6 because I didn't know you needed
- 7 to go see a counselor to get
- 8 your life on track for the next
- 9 few years. I knew none of this.
- 10 Do you know who taught me this?
- 11 My professors during the office
- 12 hours and me going and asking --
- 13 start off with questions what is
- 14 the cosine of this? Or hey I

- 15 don't understand these numbers
- 16 and letters? Where do the
- 17 letters come into math, what the
- 18 hell? But those conversations
- 19 developed into something more
- 20 beautiful and something called
- 21 mentoring and the professor
- 22 asked me what I wanted to do. I
- 23 said I wanted to change the word
- 24 and impact the entire community
- 25 so we started talking about hey

- 1 here's a road map. Here's some
- 2 of the things you can do and I
- 3 say "he" because it was one
- 4 professor in particular and I
- 5 think everyone knows kind --
- 6 [INAUDIBLE] this week but it's
- 7 these conversations that had
- 8 that guided me where my parents
- 9 couldn't. Not because they want

- like myself or the numerous
- students that I share the
- 11 professor with on expanding

- their opportunities you know. Professor Mera who was nominated 13 for the [INAUDIBLE] year award and not him but the student 15 guess in the video and they 17 wouldn't be in the position they were if it wasn't for office hours and a professor that can do things outside the classroom 20 because he's paid to -- not paid 22 to but he is flying between different colleges. "I'm sorry
- 25 have to go to Whitaker college

I can't get the question and I

- 2 and I don't blame them. You

- 5 we here tonight; right? You have

- 6 heard some several of my
- 7 colleagues and students about
- 8 what we need to make Cerritos
- 9 College truly an excellent place
- 10 to study and learn and we're
- 11 here to advocate for our working
- 12 conditions but more importantly
- 13 the improved learning conditions
- 14 because they're intertwined. A
- 15 student taking 15 units a full
- 16 course load will spend 270 hours
- 17 with the semesters and more if
- 18 she joins a club or goes to
- 19 office hours or help with the
- 20 counselors or DSPS or the
- 21 student success or the library.
- 22 She won't spend that much time
- 23 with Dr. Fierro or another
- 24 Administrator until she's having
- 25 a particularly bad semester. So

- 1 while we the faculty recognize
- 2 that it would be impossible to
- 3 do our job without the support

- 4 of Administrators or staff it's
- 5 important for everyone here to
- 6 recognize that without the
- 7 faculty, the teachers, this
- 8 institution would have no reason
- 9 to exist. We are a school. Our
- 10 job is to help students learn.
- 11 We sell education and the
- 12 faculty, the teachers are the
- 13 ones that design and deliver
- 14 that education and the support
- 15 services that accompany it, so
- 16 and I want to repeat this. We
- 17 respect the role that management
- 18 and staff have to play in this
- 19 endeavor and in return we expect
- 20 the same respect for all role
- 21 and there are many ways that
- 22 this district can start to
- 23 demonstrate that respect. They
- 24 can do it by allocating the
- 25 resources necessary to ensure

- 1 that all students have equal
- 2 access to their professors

- 3 regardless whether that person
- 4 is full or part time. They can
- 5 address the incredible
- 6 inequities in the pay and
- 7 working conditions between full
- 8 and part time faculty. They can
- 9 continue the tradition of health
- 10 care for Trustees and employees
- 11 and working to extend that
- 12 benefit which is a human right
- 13 to everyone that works here and
- 14 ensure that the Administration
- 15 continues to commit the time and
- 16 resources necessary to negotiate
- 17 a full and complete contract
- 18 with the union. It's been 15
- 19 years. Right? We acknowledge
- 20 that some of the things will
- 21 cost the district money but we
- 22 know it can be done because when
- 23 we look at schools of similar
- 24 size in the area and see the
- 25 problems solved and while they

- 1 have lower class sizes so they
- 2 are in essence less efficient
- 3 than we are. Like they said a
- 4 budget is a moral document.
- 5 Over the past year I have seen
- 6 so many examples of this board
- 7 making decisions that prioritize
- 8 our shared values over pure
- 9 financial gain. This is another
- 10 opportunity where you can
- 11 exercise your power to create
- 12 the type of place you would want
- 13 to work and live and learn.
- 14 Thank you.
- 15 [Applause]
- 16 >> President Lewis: If there
- 17 are no other constituent reports
- 18 but there is.
- 19 >> I am now the ASCC Vice
- 20 President.
- 21 >> Is that the same hat?
- 22 >> Sorry. It's the super hero
- 23 costume. I know you feel --
- 24 never mind. It was a bad joke.
- 25 I shouldn't have done it, so I

- 1 would like to elaborate on those
- 2 comments. We passed a budget.
- 3 We did it on time under budget
- 4 too. We originally 1.3
- 5 something so under budget. In
- 6 addition to CCM Chicano
- 7 community medicine had a
- 8 conference this past Saturday of
- 9 over 100 local community members
- 10 coming to talk about pre-med and
- 11 speaking to their parents what
- 12 to expect for your student. How
- 13 being a pre-med might change
- 14 them from doing so many chores
- 15 and responsibilities and how
- 16 difficult it's going to be and
- 17 great turn out and had STEM day
- 18 and lots of students came out
- 19 and coming to Cerritos College
- 20 which echo with the idea we want
- 21 to provide a similar environment
- 22 through shared experience that
- 23 we have, so we hope to condition
- 24 that tradition in the a few
- 25 years and the students getting a

- 1 great education here and I am
- 2 sorry I am going to do something
- 3 I don't normally. Do I hate
- 4 doing this but I want to notify
- 5 the board we had two alumni that
- 6 left to teach somewhere
- 7 elsewhere in the chemistry
- 8 department and the outstanding
- 9 professor award was given to the
- 10 Cerritos College alumni this
- 11 year and lost them to full time
- 12 positions because we weren't
- 13 able to hire full timers there
- 14 and there is a need in that
- 15 department. I'm sorry if I am
- 16 diverging from that but I forget
- 17 about it. My speech wasn't
- 18 completely written and keep that
- 19 in mind and they're some of the
- 20 best you can get and come back
- 21 to the community they learned
- 22 from and now teaching full time
- 23 at Whitaker college and we're
- 24 not able to offer employment

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- 2 [Laughter]
- 3 >> President Lewis: You forgot
- 4 to turn your hat back the other
- 5 way when you said that. Okay.
- 6 All right. Next without further
- 7 constituent group reports we
- 8 will move to Item five which is
- 9 the world world CWMUN Conference
- 10 Awards by our own Dr. Sunday
- 11 Obazuaye.
- 12 [Applause]
- 13 >> Good evening members of the
- 14 board and Mr. President Fierro
- 15 and fellow faculty and members
- 16 of the audience. Thank you very
- 17 much for this opportunity to
- 18 present to you our students who
- 19 attended the United Nations
- 20 conference in New York during
- 21 the spring break from
- 22 March 16-18. This was an
- 23 international conference. It

- 24 was held at the united nation
- 25 headquarters in New York City

- 1 and one of the highlight of the
- 2 program was from President
- 3 Clinton being one of the guest
- 4 speakers at the opening
- 5 ceremony. The student had a
- 6 good time. They represented the
- 7 school very professionally and
- 8 diplomatically. The school
- 9 represented Egypt in five areas.
- 10 Six of them won awards and best
- 11 Delegate award and best policy
- 12 paper so we have very good
- 13 students who are doing very well
- 14 and I will have the five of them
- 15 who are here with ten of them
- 16 who attend audio five are here
- 17 to introduce themselves and get
- 18 your approval. Also at the end
- 19 of the talk I would like to
- 20 present to this school the
- 21 certificate that was given to

the school by the association. 22 Thank you. [Applause] >> Good evening Board Members. 25 Sample footer 1 I'm under the weather but I came tonight to share with you the celebration and admiration for my fellow colleagues. We traveled all the way across the nation to New York, New York and went inside of the actual United Nations. We got to see where world leaders come together and 10 make decisions where they speak 11 and they really negotiate with each other and we got to be a 13 part of that process. - 17 I'm the former President of the
- 18 Club of Modern United Nations.

Now this has been I honestly lost track how many conferences I went to the UN since high school but this the first time I attended at the headquarters and as dreamer it was a great opportunity to be in that Sample footer building. I always dreamed of 2 working in international relations since I was little so being in that building gave me a lot of emotions. I was actually in the committee of General Assembly me and my co-delegate and I we won the Delegate's award and the best Delegate if had the committee. 6 College Radio Station about two 7 months ago by the **Intercollegiate Broadcasting** System. 10 [Applause] 11 >> As I was saying I remember six years ago almost to the day 12 I was standing here and I wound up in tears as I was nearly begging the people in your seats to not shut the radio station down. I don't think I had 18 anything to do with it but 19 something decided to keep the pilot light on and give us a S 20 second chance and I guess we made the moat of it. I would like to tell you the place where 24 people make a difference, the 25 America's Best Community College Sample footer

- 1 Radio Station in America and the
- 2 Cerritos College and the not the
- 3 first time we were nominated for

- 4 the award. I had opportunities
- 5 after I told them we were
- 6 nominated and what an
- 7 achievement and said "yeah but
- 8 we didn't win." that cocktail
- 9 of ignorance that you have
- 10 experienced in your life I am
- 11 sure and we won this year and
- 12 after that one of the students
- 13 down played the award we won if
- 14 he says something like that to
- 15 me again I'm going to look him
- 16 in the eye and said "yeah, but
- 17 we won." no, probably a better
- 18 choice but I like to do that too
- 19 but besides the nominations for
- 20 best Cerritos College radio
- 21 station we were nominated for
- 22 best streaming station and five
- 23 nominations in the five years
- 24 since we have been entering
- 25 these competitions. No other

- 1 student staff station radio
- 2 station college or university

- 3 can match that and WPMD is the
- 4 best in the country this year
- 5 but the best student radio
- 6 station over the last five years
- 7 everywhere in the country. But
- 8 beyond those awards what is
- 9 going on the other side of the
- 10 radio? Now the company that
- 11 takes our signal up to the
- 12 internet our account we can look
- 13 on a page and see not only how
- 14 many people are listening and
- 15 where they're listening to the
- 16 point of having their IP
- 17 addresses. You talk about big
- 18 brother more than the CBS
- 19 replacement show it's here and I
- 20 am glad to show anybody what I
- 21 am talking about. -- WPMD has
- 22 been heard in 65 countries and
- 23 some tune us in and gone in a
- 24 couple of minutes but that's
- 25 stated and we had people listen

- 1 to Korea and over 30 areas and
- 2 India for 80 hours and Vietnam
- 3 one hundred hours and Germany
- 4 many and the UK hundreds of
- 5 hours. You can tell, you can
- 6 look on a map and really narrow
- 7 down to about a mile as to where
- 8 people are listening. It's
- 9 amazing. There's a place in
- 10 Germany and some resort area and
- 11 resort they say people are
- 12 listening and nothing around and
- 13 they never turn it off. They
- 14 listen to us everyday 24 hours a
- 15 day and I can only assume it's
- 16 an American themed coffee shop
- 17 in that hotel and I will tell
- 18 you that is like the greatest
- 19 complement that the station has
- 20 ever gotten that people that far
- 21 away can get it off the internet
- 22 have chosen us to represent
- 23 American culture. Besides that
- 24 there is an audience measurement
- 25 that radio stations use TSL time

- 1 spent listening and the time
- 2 they turn it on to off and that
- 3 number in radio has been
- 4 dropping as you imagine. It's
- 5 down to 12 minutes and eight
- 6 seconds. And I checked this
- 7 today and our ranged from 85
- 8 minutes to 106 minutes much
- 9 better than commercial radio and
- 10 out of the three studios that
- 11 we're in the process of out
- 12 growing obviously. We must be
- 13 doing something right. I am
- 14 also amazed how our people get
- 15 so good so quick. I don't have
- 16 a lot of direction. They don't
- 17 need it. We give support and you
- 18 see what happens and I woke up
- 19 last night at 1230 in the
- 20 morning and not fall back to
- 21 sleep until 4:00 a.m. and the
- 22 idea hit me it's confidence and
- 23 you hear that just listening to
- 24 them. There's a sense that they
- 25 know they got this on the air.

- 1 WPMD doesn't teach them to be
- 2 discjokeys but performers. I
- 3 look back at my college radio
- 4 days and what I got out it and I
- 5 am not bragging and I'm not
- 6 famous or rich yet God willing
- 7 and I have been on TV a few
- 8 times and network TV and voice
- 9 and stage work and wrote five
- 10 books corporate videos and
- 11 ad-lib and got my chops working
- 12 for a station like WPMD. You
- 13 want to create a muse come in.
- 14 You want to talk about new bands
- 15 you can do that on unorthodox
- 16 radio and you want to talk about
- 17 the Trump Administration you can
- 18 do that. We had a show and
- 19 students improvised a show every
- 20 week. Whatever you want to do
- 21 as a performer short of dancing
- 22 and juggling can you do on
- 23 station. You can come in with a
- 24 pass and sharing with other with

1	bullet proof and nothing is more
2	valuable to the performer even

- 3 those that leave and read from a
- 4 church every Sunday and nothing
- 5 is more important than
- 6 confidence and you can do it and
- 7 do it good and that's what we
- 8 teach and that's what I am proud
- 9 of. The stuff that we produce
- 10 that come out of the speakers
- 11 and producing for 40 years now
- 12 and the award is shared by all
- 13 of them. Now I have to play Don
- 14 Corleone for a second. There
- 15 maybe a time when I come back
- 16 and ask for a favor and I lived
- 17 in L.A. long enough to not
- 18 expect them and I promise to
- 19 deliver and if I come back it's
- 20 for something very necessary and
- 21 be as relationship as I can make
- 22 it no one will wind up with a
- 23 horse's head in the bed. There

- 25 obsessive compulsive which I am.

- 9 WPMD have done and the
- 10 nominations and wins and our way
- 11 to say thank you and the show of
- 12 faith six years ago and continue
- 13 as the voice of Cerritos
- 14 College. Now, I never come to
- 15 see you guys empty handed, so we
- 16 broke the piggy banks. [Off

- 24 Definitely very inspirational.
- 25 Thank you Casey. Thank you.

- 3 >> Dr. Fierro: Casey forgot
- 4 to mention something. He has
- 5 done a lot of work and obviously
- 6 he was able to get that award

- 7 >> The newspaper article I
- 8 don't deserve credit and Miya
- 9 Walker does and others and they
- 10 deserve the credit for making
- 11 that happen.
- 12 [Applause]
- 13 >> President Lewis: Thank
- 14 you. All right. Next we will
- 15 have a Forensics Team update by
- 16 April Griffin.
- 17 >> [Off Mic].
- 18 >> Hello my name is Nicholas

- 9 people and served as honorary
- 10 judges for us and Dr. Fierro,
- 11 Rick Miranda, Dean Fabbish and
- 12 Dean Miller and took the time
- 13 out of their busy schedules to
- 14 see what we do and the
- 15 transformative power this event

- 16 has for our students, and so17 before I turn it over to my18 students lastly I want to
 - 19 recognize April Griffin who is
- 20 the Director of the program and
- 21 I will actually be stepping into
- 22 her role next year because April
- 23 has been elected as Faculty
- 24 Senate President and I don't
- 25 think it's a mistake April comes

- 1 from the world of forensic and
- 2 train leaders in education and
- 3 industry and non-profits. We
- 4 train leaders in politics and
- 5 government. Forensic is the
- 6 place where you will find
- 7 leaders in action so I want to
- 8 give you the opportunity to hear
- 9 from some of those leaders who I
- 10 have brought us with tonight and
- 11 have them give you a sense of
- 12 what their experience has been
- 13 this year.
- 14 >> Hello Board Members,

- 15 constituent students. I'm a16 film studies major here in17 Cerritos College and the best
 - 18 memory of this year for me was
- 19 being able to articulate a
- 20 speech during a debate that was
- 21 just perfect. It was just
- 22 perfect. I didn't win but is it
- 23 was perfect --
- 24 [Laughter]
- 25 >> The second best moment was

- 1 getting a snow ball and having
- 2 the perfect ark to hit April
- 3 right like in the back. It was
- 4 so clean. Like Tom Brady would
- 5 have been I need some tips kid.
- 6 Now I believe memories is like
- 7 for example giving the perfect
- 8 speech is something that
- 9 requires context. For me I'm a
- 10 first generation American. My
- 11 mother went to Brazil when she
- 12 was 16 and didn't speak a lick

- 13 of Portuguese and came when I was ten and didn't speak a lick of English. Now for me of course I have been here for a while. I have spoken the language many times with many 18

 - people and I've had plenty of
 - conservations with Americans.
 - The only thing was creating that
 - confidence and being able to
 - stand in front of people and
 - being able to talk to them about
 - the issues at hand. Now in

- forensic what we do is talk
- exactly about that. We create
- empathy because we don't get to
- pick sides. It doesn't matter
- if you're a Trump supporter or
- not if that is -- if you're
- affirmative or negative in that
- issue and you better learn and
- that's forensics and it's not
- just about new issues or talking
- 11 well. It's about knowing what

- 12 you're saying and finding the
 13 truth. Now being this way,
 14 being a person who needed to
 15 master the language, who needed
 16 to really convey what I wanted
 17 in a film set is something that
 - 18 I sorely lacked before
- 19 forensics. After forensics I
- 20 can see an improvement. I am

university classes there and 19 during day time they teach some of the community college class 21 and more interesting they have 22 added a high school that is 23 actually being taught there so students from high school are taking classes, college classes Sample footer and they go on and can get a four year degree from any of the

- four universities and paralegal,
 nursing and actually if I am not
 mistaken I believe University of
 LaVerne actually offers a
 doctorate of education at
 college of the canyons.
- 9 >>Carmen Avalos: Thank you. I
- 10 think that certainly opens the
- 11 door for more partnerships in
- 12 terms of what we offer at
- 13 Cerritos College so I appreciate
- 14 the feedback.
- 15 >> You're welcome.

- 16 >> Thank you.
- 17 >> President Lewis: Trustee
- 18 Birkey.
- 19 >> James Cody Birkey: Real
- 20 quick how does national source
- 21 the teaching staff?
- 22 >> That's another interesting
- 23 point. They will look to us to
- 24 try to have our adjunct and full
- 25 time faculty teach the paralegal

- 1 courses. We will have first
- 2 crack at any of the teaching
- 3 courses and again when we get
- 4 into a specific area and
- 5 criminal law for example if we
- 6 don't have an instructor
- 7 available they will have the
- 8 instructors that are available
- 9 but we get the first chance to
- 10 teach and one of the things many
- 11 of the students asked. You mean
- 12 we can get the same instructors
- 13 and teach us through the four
- 14 year program? And the answer is

15 yes to a degree. We do the best 16 we can to staff with our own people and hiring nor adjuncts to deal with that. 19 >> In all of the staff is paid 20 by National. >> No money from the college. 21 It's all National pay for the 23 staff. >> So the way I am 25 understanding this then in some Sample footer 1 extent because the state hasn't opened the door for a four year 3 program in this particular year. We're sort of borrowing their accreditation in some respect in order to have them host the final two years of a program?

- open that up and that's so far I
 think it's been three years
 since the last time they did it.
 I did check I found out about
 the opportunity. I was advised
 - 18 of it after the fact and I did
 - 19 check. I spoke with the
- 20 Chancellor's Office and asked if
- 21 any community college applied
- 22 for paralegal and none applied
- 23 but understand if we get that
- 24 opportunity it's a process that
- 25 we have to wait for legislature

- 1 to approve it. Then we have
- 2 submit it. We need a number of
- 3 classes. We would definitely
- 4 have to add instructors and
- 5 right now I don't know if that
- 6 is even a possibility to add
- 7 instructors so might be a catch
- 8 22 that we have the opportunity
- 9 but we can't do it because of a
- 10 lack of funding for example.
- 11 >> Maybe this is a question

- 12 for Jose. Dr. Fierro do we have
- 13 -- like a five year term is what
- 14 this agreement covers. Does
- 15 that sound about like the
- 16 realistic ramp up time if we
- 17 were ever to offer a four year
- 18 course on campus that was
- 19 Cerritos specific. It would
- 20 roughly take that time anyhow
- 21 before we're up and running?
- 22 >> Dr. Fierro: Probably
- 23 because we have to wait for
- 24 legislation to be moved through
- 25 and then it's a year for that

- 1 process. Application will be
- 2 another year and the time take
- 3 to build I would say about three
- 4 to five years before -- if we
- 5 were going to get approved now
- 6 before we were able to do it.
- 7 >> [Off Mic].
- 8 >> President Lewis: Can you
- 9 come to the mic please.

10 >> Thank you. One of the 11 issues with filing for the program and having these four 13 year programs one of the caveats that the program you were 15 choosing to offer was not offered at a neighboring four 17 year college, and that's you know CJ is offered at all of the 19 four year schools. Paralegal has not so that limited 20 institutions to look at the type of programs you can offer because if you put forth a program you have to look at its viability within that demand and Sample footer

- 1 can you draw students to say we
- 2 need the resources for the
- 3 staffing, the faculty, et
- 4 cetera, so just keep that in
- 5 mind while it's five years and
- 6 even if the window is open if
- 7 that piece and legislation
- 8 doesn't change then we're kind

- 9 of limited. It's not saying
- 10 that Cerritos can't do it
- 11 because we have areas like
- 12 paralegal and health occupation
- 13 and one in the technology area
- 14 that might fit the bill but not
- 15 in direct competition with the
- 16 four year counter parts.
- 17 >> I haven't had a chance to
- 18 kind of poor over this contract.
- 19 What kind of extension clauses
- 20 are there? In other words do
- 21 they have any opportunity or
- 22 right to extend without our
- 23 consent?
- 24 >> Dr. Fierro: Yes, so there
- 25 is the first year we do the

- 1 review at the end of the year to
- 2 make sure everything is going
- 3 well and after that to terminate
- 4 the agreement with proper
- 5 notification.
- 6 >> With no penalty?

7 >> Dr. Fierro: No. Obviously

if we have students going

- 9 through the program we have to
- 10 have an arrangement to teach out
- 11 the students or find a way for
- 12 the students to complete the
- 13 program but the agreement could
- 14 be terminated just by providing
- 15 notice.
- 16 >> No contractual penalty?
- 17 Okay.
- 18 >> President Lewis: Any other
- 19 comments from Board Members?
- 20 Trustee Perez.
- 21 >> Marisa Perez: I'm on the
- 22 fence of this and not that there
- 23 isn't a need but we didn't get a
- 24 good deal and I looked at the
- 25 contract again and the 15% -- I

- 1 don't know, I mean that's
- 2 something we should probably get
- a little more for our students.
- 4 and then I also see here too
- 5 that this rate is subject to

- 6 normal tuition increases, so
- 7 they're locking in the rates for
- 8 the students either and again I
- 9 just think that we need to just
- 10 be very mindful of who our
- 11 student population is and again
- 12 this is going to be using their
- 13 financial aid and are coming in
- 14 already having financial aid
- 15 used already for the two year
- 16 and I don't know. Like I said I
- 17 am kind of on the fence. If we
- 18 do move forward with this I
- 19 think before we have -- before
- 20 we even consider a five year
- 21 term -- I'm not sure why five
- 22 years is the term. I would need
- 23 to see some data to come back to
- 24 see about completion rates and
- 25 success rates and once our

- 1 students are going through this
- 2 program are they getting jobs?
- 3 Is there salary -- what is the

- 4 salary progression? Because
- 5 again we had concerns in the
- 6 past when we opened up to
- 7 Norwood and automotive partners
- 8 and some of my concerns the
- 9 first time and now we're talking
- 10 about it again and again I'm on
- 11 the fence.
- 12 >> President Lewis: Question
- 13 Dr. Fierro. If we don't have
- 14 approve this contract or table
- 15 it for a further meeting is
- 16 there any consequences of not
- 17 doing it at this meeting as it
- 18 stands now? Can it be postponed
- 19 [INAUDIBLE].
- 20 >> Dr. Fierro: Well, it would
- 21 best postponed. There all right
- 22 some consequences. The first
- 23 one is in order for them to
- 24 offer the program here they have
- 25 to apply to WASC, the

- 1 Accrediting Commission for
- 2 senior institutions to extend

- 3 the accreditation to an
- 4 additional site and they have a
- 5 deadline to meet in order for us
- 6 to begin the program in the fall
- 7 so if we postpone it we could
- 8 run the risk of not beginning in
- 9 the fall.
- 10 >> President Lewis: Okay.
- 11 Any other comments from other
- 12 Board Members regarding this
- 13 issue either directly to Bruce
- 14 or to Dr. Fierro or just a
- 15 wayward comment.
- 16 >> Bruce to Trustee Perez's
- 17 comment you elaborate to your
- 18 knowledge on the success rate of
- 19 national and the implications to
- 20 our students of having this
- 21 versus any other route they
- 22 might take?
- 23 >> In regard to paralegal you
- 24 got to try hard not to get a
- 25 job. I went out to work

- 1 experience today. I had to go
- 2 to four job sites where we sent
- 3 our students to intern. Three
- 4 of them got job offers already.
- 5 Every one of our students can
- 6 get a job offer. It's a
- 7 demanding field. I spoke with
- 8 Laura who use to be on the
- 9 Advisory Board. She does estate
- 10 planning. She said "we cannot
- 11 find paralegals to do estate
- 12 planning." I talked to one
- 13 paralegal and a major retailer
- 14 and has a job offer to double
- 15 the salary to work for Matel.
- 16 There is so much demand and they
- 17 require people to have a four
- 18 year degree and a catch 22 that
- 19 they can't get the higher salary
- 20 because they don't have that
- 21 degree unless it's in another
- 22 subject. The advantage national
- 23 and the night classes and work
- 24 during the day and take the
- 25 class and one Saturday and in

- 1 two years they end up with a
- 2 four year degree in paralegal
- 3 studies and that's the program
- 4 advantage. University of
- 5 LaVerne, nothing wrong with that
- 6 program. We work them and have
- 7 Articulation Programs with
- 8 National University and LaVerne
- 9 and students can take more
- 10 classes for the third and fourth
- 11 year and save them a few bucks
- 12 but we need to get them the
- 13 Bachelor's Degree for the
- 14 absolute top dollars.
- 15 Paralegals are paid at some
- 16 firms six figures and very high
- 17 paid people if they have the
- 18 basic skills and they have to
- 19 have that Bachelor's Degree to
- 20 get the absolutely top dollar
- 21 but getting a job it's easy. I
- 22 am serious.
- 23 >> You're saying regardless
- 24 whether they attend national or
- 25 any other institution for a four

- 1 year program?
- 2 >> Correct. Because right now
- 3 if you need a four year degree
- 4 it's in a subject probably other
- 5 than paralegal because there are
- 6 only two schools that offer it
- 7 and one of the things that
- 8 happen we have a Paralegal
- 9 Certificate so we get some
- 10 students that come and have the
- 11 4-degree already and then get
- 12 the Paralegal Certificate.
- 13 We're trying to reverse that and
- 14 get the AA and then a four year
- 15 degree but the students are
- 16 saying I want a degree in law.
- 17 Well, there is no such thing.
- 18 You don't get a Bachelor's
- 19 Degree in law. I'm a lawyer and
- 20 my degree is in accounting.
- 21 Students aren't interested in
- 22 accounting and interested in law
- 23 and this the opportunity to give
- 24 a Bachelor's Degree in an area

- 1 third and fourth year they're
- 2 taking array of subjects they
- 3 wouldn't have been taking at the
- 4 lower levels and classes so
- 5 they're well diversified and
- 6 giving a greater opportunity to
- 7 find a job.
- 8 >> Shin Liu: This course is
- 9 offered here during the evening
- 10 time?
- 11 >> Are you talking about at
- 12 Cerritos?
- 13 >> Shin Liu: No, with
- 14 national.
- 15 >> All of the classes will be
- 16 night time and Saturdays. Now I
- 17 do want to mention it's been so
- 18 successful at College of the
- 19 Canyons my understanding they
- 20 will run a night and a day
- 21 because they have such a demand
- 22 in Valencia.
- 23 >> Shin Liu: I think this

- 24 creates benefit for students and
- 25 night time we don't use up all

- 1 the classroom and you know I
- 2 work for another college. We
- 3 have a program with LaVerne
- 4 University. We didn't pay \$25
- 5 and we have a management
- 6 program, and it really allow
- 7 student to you know -- they
- 8 don't have to go fight the
- 9 traffic. They just come to the
- 10 school. They usually take the
- 11 courses, so I really don't feel
- 12 this is National University take
- 13 you know advantage of us. I do
- 14 believe we are creating benefit
- 15 for student and it's a win-win
- 16 situation. I think this is good
- 17 for student. That's just my
- 18 opinion.
- 19 >> President Lewis:
- 20 Dr. Salazar.
- 21 >> What are they doing after?

- 22 Are they getting the BA? I lost
- 23 my train of thought. My second
- 24 question -- it will come back to
- 25 me.

- 1 >> Let me answer the question.
- 2 We have a AA in paralegal and a
- 3 Paralegal Certificate and to get
- 4 that certificate you need a AA
- 5 or a higher degree so to answer
- 6 the question if they're getting
- 7 a certificate they already have
- 8 a AA Degree. Usually an AA
- 9 Degree. Administration of
- 10 justice and usually have a
- 11 Bachelor's Degree and people
- 12 that went to college and got the
- 13 Bachelor's Degree ten, 15 years
- 14 ago and the kids are out of high
- 15 school. They wanted to come
- 16 back. They always wanted to and
- 17 have an interest in law and a
- 18 number of students went on and
- 19 get either a Paralegal
- 20 Certificate. They become a

- 21 paralegal or a number of
- 22 transferred over to law school.
- 23 >> The bulk of the students
- 24 are getting the certificate, not
- 25 the AA?

- 1 >> They're getting the AA.
- 2 >> What are they doing after?
- 3 Getting a job for the most part.
- 4 They go on and get a job and
- 5 that's one of the advantages
- 6 that Dr. Liu was mentioning the
- 7 night classes want they can work
- 8 during the day and take the
- 9 Bachelor's Degree two nights a
- 10 week and to be more marketable.
- 11 With an AA Degree from approved
- 12 school like we are there is a
- 13 large demand for paralegals and
- 14 I am just telling you the
- 15 highest demand and have years of
- 16 experience need a Bachelor's
- 17 Degree. This allows people with
- 18 an AA to start working and move

19 on and get the degree at the 20 same time. 21 >> The other question how many 22 students do you think we will enroll with the pilot? 24 >> It's interesting. I will 25 say we will definitely fill up Sample footer at least one cohort hopefully in 2 August. Now we're into May and do a little bit of advertising. The one thing we have the Emails of all graduate students. We always communicate with them and send the newsletter four types a year and let them know what is going on. I am hopeful they will fill up the cohort quickly 11 and again this is why we're looking at it for one year. 12 Let's see what happens. If it doesn't work it doesn't work but let's see if can get the first one going and go from there and that's what we're trying do.

- 18 >> The last question how did
- 19 the partnership come about? And
- 20 who negotiated and how did we
- 21 come about in the contract the
- 22 cost and --
- 23 >> Well, I think I probably
- 24 brought it to Dean Mason because
- 25 national came to us. They're

- 1 interested in doing this
- 2 program. They already did at
- 3 college of the canyons and the
- 4 college in Antelope Valley.
- 5 >> Yeah
- 6 >> And they actually have a
- 7 program I believe education at
- 8 Santa Monica City College. They
- 9 offer a Bachelor's Degree there
- 10 as well so they to us in that we
- 11 have a relationship and we
- 12 exchanged information. I'm on
- 13 their advisory board. They're
- 14 on our board. We meet each
- 15 other at paralegal conferences

- 16 and asked if it's something of
- 17 interest to us and I brought it
- 18 to Dean Mason and we brought it
- 19 it to Dr. Fierro. As far as the
- 20 negotiating a lot has to do with
- 21 the fact what they're doing at
- 22 the other schools. If I am not
- 23 mistaken they handed the
- 24 contracts for Santa Monica and
- 25 Antelope Valley and we copied

- 1 them if I am not mistaken.
- 2 >> So the college is the same
- 3 compared to the other colleges?
- 4 >> Dr. Fierro: It's about the
- 5 same as every other college and
- 6 the way we calculated the usage
- 7 fee essentially we look at the
- 8 issues of copying and printing
- 9 and maybe less than that based
- 10 on the bulk rate we get on
- 11 printing.
- 12 >> Okay. Thank you. I mean I
- 13 think it's great and I think it
- 14 would be a huge service to our

students and getting them to the 16 next level. >> I always think it's an 17 attraction to the students because we have do some 20 competition for the program. Fullerton College offers it. Coast line offer its. El Camino offers and Pasadena and East L.A. and if you're in high 25 school and I want a four year Sample footer

- 1 degree and go to Cerritos
- 2 College and get the two years
- 3 and stay there and get the four
- 4 year degree. I think it will be
- 5 attractive to those students as
- 6 well and a benefit there trying
- 7 to get more students into our
- 8 program. We already get a lot
- 9 of students. We have students
- 10 that drive in from Riverside and
- 11 one that drives in from Temecula
- 12 because we have a very good

- 13 program. I know it's the
- 14 strongest in the state. It's
- 15 probably one of the strongest in
- 16 the country. I mean just people
- 17 know of our program especially
- 18 the lawyers in this area and the
- 19 Los Angeles area and we have
- 20 been ABA approved since 1986.
- 21 >> Bruce you can confirm that
- 22 National University is a
- 23 non-profit based out of San
- 24 Diego and for the most part only
- 25 works in California and a little

- 1 bit in Nevada; right?
- 2 >> I don't know where they
- 3 work but I have been told -- I
- 4 haven't checked but I have been
- 5 told they're a non-profit and
- 6 based in San Diego. The campus
- 7 closest is near LAX and I don't
- 8 know if you seen the courthouse
- 9 at corner of 105 and the 405 but
- 10 there is another small four
- 11 story building there and the

- 12 campus is over there.
- 13 >> Okay. My understanding
- 14 even though they're called
- 15 national they're not national
- 16 and it's more local.
- 17 >> That's my understanding
- 18 too. I'm not sure.
- 19 >> President Lewis: All
- 20 right. Seeing now it's
- 21 9:03 p.m. I would like to bring
- 22 this to a Resolution if
- 23 possible.
- 24 >> Thank you very much.
- 25 >> President Lewis: So I will

- 22 for stakeholders and
- 23 communication and telling our
- 24 story and importantly marketing
- 25 and branding for the college so

- 2 I wanted to take you down memory
- 3 lane, the history. Our website
- 4 is considered the first of
- 5 California Community Colleges to

6 be on line. Our first website

was initiated in 1989 or at

- 8 least the DOT EDU at that time.
- 9 The college never invested in a
- 10 contact management system.
- 11 We've had a home grown system
- 12 since the 90's and carried that
- 13 on through through 2015 with a
- 14 home grown proprietary system
- 15 split over two different
- 16 platforms that you can see made
- 17 the district very vulnerable if
- 18 problems ever were to arise. I
- 19 will show you a couple of screen
- 20 shots of what the website used
- 21 to look like.
- 22 >> [INAUDIBLE] [Off Mic].
- >> So this is 2015. So when
- 24 we talk about design trends what
- 25 we looked at, we being the web

- 1 standards committee. I Chair
- 2 that committee. When we began
- 3 to look at website design we

- 4 looked at trends that make sense
- 5 to Cerritos College. It was
- 6 always important for us to stay
- 7 on trend but follow the trends
- 8 that made sense here and in this
- 9 case the criteria for the trends
- 10 that we used were simple,
- 11 content experience and mobile
- 12 responsive. So what do we mean?
- 13 Simple, less text -- navigation
- 14 and compliant and we wanted to
- 15 focus on the user. Mobile
- 16 experience being most of our
- 17 students are engaging with us
- 18 through a mobile device so we
- 19 wanted to make sure that the
- 20 experience was rich with our
- 21 mobile application and of course
- 22 the visual design. Our website
- 23 follows what we call a magazine
- 24 style. It is large or super
- 25 graphics, vibrant colors, less

- 1 text. I wanted to check you
- 2 back to where we started.

- 3 Here's the web standards
- 4 committee. Very vibrant and
- 5 engaged group. Recommendations
- 6 that the committee gave for the
- 7 website and number one web
- 8 accessibility. We were looking
- 9 for a vendor supported platform
- 10 to take us off of having a
- 11 proprietary system and only one
- 12 person on campus knew which
- 13 wasn't a good idea. With this
- 14 vendor we wanted to make sure
- 15 they had a strong presence in
- 16 higher education and web
- 17 servicing which a huge factor.
- 18 Visual design and compatibility
- 19 with our web standards in place
- 20 already. Some of the platforms
- 21 that we looked at were
- 22 extensive. As you can see we
- 23 had a lot of analysis. The ones
- 24 that came to the top, four and
- 25 [INAUDIBLE] update number one.

- 1 They're one of the largest
- 2 providers for websites in higher
- 3 education specifically in
- 4 community colleges. As you can
- 5 see one in four community
- 6 colleges in California are
- 7 already using it and major
- 8 universities are also but one of
- 9 the things about the updates
- 10 they provide an AV pack in
- 11 relation to accessibility and
- 12 critical to our team. Other
- 13 recommendations from the team
- 14 was to develop a Ad Hoc
- 15 Committee work group and
- 16 consisted of IT and public
- 17 affairs working everyday on the
- 18 website and then providing
- 19 updates and feedback to the
- 20 group. We began to do a lot of
- 21 research here on top ten most
- 22 visited pages. Comes to no
- 23 surprise they're all pretty much
- 24 in student services.
- 25 >> [Off Mic].

- 1 >> I tried to skew the numbers
- 2 but it didn't work. Other top
- 3 pages. I'm sure you're not
- 4 surprised that ABC index is one
- 5 of the top and we started the
- 6 process in 2014 believe it or
- 7 not. Research and
- 8 recommendations for several
- 9 months. Phase one, phase two.
- 10 We got to our web selections and
- 11 design concepts. Phase three
- 12 procurement and system
- 13 installation and phase four
- 14 migration and content
- 15 organization which was enormous.
- 16 You can see how much time that
- 17 took even through 2018 so to the
- 18 final phase our final migration
- 19 we faced some extraordinary
- 20 challenges but before I get into
- 21 the challenges I will tell you
- 22 as part of the website we also
- 23 looked at how do we reimagine
- 24 the daily Falcon if our
- 25 calendaring system? And that

- one of the bigger obstacles with
- 2 the website that we didn't
- 3 anticipate is the amount of just
- 4 technical problems that came
- 5 with it, but we resolved them
- 6 and I will show you how we got
- 7 through that. Phase five when
- 8 we finally got to our launch
- 9 date it was literally almost the
- 10 death of me and my team trying
- 11 to get this site launched. We
- 12 had been given a preliminary
- 13 deadline of November of 2017
- 14 that we were unable to meet just
- 15 based on the sheer volume of
- 16 technical problems and personnel
- 17 changes that came up during the
- 18 process we were unable to do it,
- 19 but through a lot of strategic
- 20 repositioning and just working
- 21 at it everyday we were able to
- 22 finally identify a launch date
- 23 which was during spring break.
- 24 We were trying to minimize the

1	disruption. I am happy to say
2	we were able to launch with the
3	help of IT with no interruptions
4	and I will tell you and go on
5	the record and say that
6	[INAUDIBLE] Chavez was a huge
7	critical part of to this
8	process. We lost our web
9	Administrator midstream in the
10	middle of the migration and
11	Samuel came and pushed us and
12	helped get to this. >> This is
13	no way we could have got there
14	without him and the IT team and
15	I wanted thought them out. We
16	have several people work tandem
17	on the process and the whole
18	team and curated photos I
19	have taken photos and others
20	taken photo to get content and
21	pictures lined up for this so a
22	huge thank you to all of the

23 public affairs team to our

- 24 classified staff who helped us
- 25 collect pictures and so forth,

- 1 so some of the roadblocks that

 - New Taipei City. The
- 20 arrangements provide the
- students with housing, with
- 22 transportation, medical
- insurance, and three meals a
- day. The only thing that isn't
- covered -- plus the cultural

- experiences and the university
- tuition. The only thing that is
- missed is the airfare. We
- identified resources from
- facility rentals that we could
- use to cover the cost of some of
- the tickets for students that
- need them. The current requests

- 9 -- the most urgent one there10 would be for 18 students that
- 11 are currently in the list to
- 12 travel to Taiwan and not all of
- 13 them need assistance with their
- 14 ticket. The trip will take
- 15 place on May 26 coming back six
- 16 week after. The second part of
- 17 the item is request for approval
- 18 for Trustee Camacho-Rodriguez
- 19 and Trustee Avalos to escort our
- 20 students to Taipei, participate
- 21 in the opening ceremonies in the
- 22 first week and meet with
- 23 university officials. Southern
- 24 Taiwan University of Science and
- 25 Technology and other city

- 1 members and officials from other

- 4 >> President Lewis: All
- 5 right. Is there any discussion
- 6 on this item? . Trustee Liu.

- 7 >> Shin Liu: I really
- 8 appreciate college support this
- 9 program. I have a question is
- 10 now we're going to support
- 11 student -- the airline ticket.
- 12 I want to know because this
- 13 actual curriculum so I want to
- 14 know you know would that be fair
- 15 for all student? For example
- 16 some students say "I'm going to
- 17 pay myself right now" but can
- 18 we have a system for the student

- 10 and 25 found for all of the
- 11 programs and the -- for all of
- 12 the three programs.
- 13 >> Yeah.
- 14 >> Dr. Fierro: As I said as
- 15 the item is currently open for
- 16 your recommendation so we simply
- 17 identify the money. The
- 18 boundaries of the trip to Tainan
- 19 is for Trustee Avalos and
- 20 Camacho and travel for the
- 21 students and asking for your
- 22 recommendation.
- 23 >> Carmen Avalos: Dr. Fierro
- 24 here's the question and because
- 25 we have the three programs and

- 1 how they're structured and
- 2 they're each structured a little

- 3 differently so recognizing that
- 4 we did pay for the students last
- 5 year we thought it was the right
- 6 thing in terms of paying this
- 7 year because we haven't set up a
- 8 system by which students knew in
- 9 advance this program was coming
- 10 and again we're fast tracking it
- 11 because we're there. We have a
- 12 few weeks before the end of
- 13 school before the program starts
- 14 and knowing now this is going to
- 15 be -- and we signed contracts
- 16 with the a few of the
- 17 universities there this is going
- 18 to be an ongoing program and
- 19 we're going to now have the time
- 20 knowing it will come back next
- 21 year to really put something in
- 22 place that will allow us to
- 23 obviously set up a process,
- 24 right, by which we allocate some
- 25 funding and not all and have the

- 1 opportunity to have students who
- 2 may be interested energy in
- 3 teaching be part of teaching and
- 4 have that realm and teach
- 5 students in diverse backgrounds
- 6 and knowing those are some of
- 7 the things they're looking for
- 8 from our students and that we
- 9 have something in place going
- 10 forward and for this time for
- 11 this particular funding is going

- 13 program. Is that correct?
- 14 That's what I understood and I
- 15 would like to see that but I
- 16 think too if we move forward the
- 17 other program and the semester
- 18 program we have a little bit of
- 19 time to bring this item back

- 23 moving into this late in the
- 24 game so I think that was the
- 25 concern and why we're doing this

- 1 tonight. Am I correct?
- 2 >> Dr. Fierro: Yes. You're
- 3 correct on some aspects of it
- 4 and the students traveling to
- 5 Tainan we need to approve this
- 6 even to either buy the tickets
- 7 or not and let them know whether
- 8 or not the students are going
- 9 and the allocation I am asking
- 10 for direction how you would like
- 11 to have it done? You could
- 12 provide direction to say you
- 13 want to use that for the three
- 14 trips or not and bring different
- 15 items. Some of the limitations
- 16 that we have on how to allocate
- 17 funding for this is we have to
- 18 identify non taxpayer dollars to
- 19 be able to cover the student
- 20 costs. We aren't able to use
- 21 non -- taxpayer dollars to cover
- 22 that, so if you were going to
- 23 fund all the students we will
- 24 need to identify about 40,000 or
- 25 something like that -- 18 plus

- 1 20 for Taipei and 12 for --
- $2 \gg 12$ for at a pay. 16 for new
- 3 Taipei and 18 --
- 4 >> Possibly for Tainan.
- 5 >> Yeah.
- 6 >> Dr. Fierro: So 44,000 I
- 7 think.
- 8 >> Shin Liu: Can we establish
- 9 a scholarship system in the
- 10 future or maybe including this
- 11 time so allow students to have
- 12 opportunities? They can plan
- 13 ahead of time you know. I know
- 14 -- you know because the
- 15 contracts are for five years so
- 16 they know so I know I should set
- 17 aside so much money and I can
- 18 have a scholarship after I
- 19 complete the program after I
- 20 went over there and I complete
- 21 it? Because it's a learning
- 22 opportunity for student too, so
- 23 I believe they should complete a
- 24 program and come back be able to

- 1 know it's a learning too, so I

- 7 kids that are going in July that
- 8 a majority had expressed
- 9 interest because they were told
- 10 that it would be paid for, so
- 11 would that number change if
- 12 that's not what we're going to
- 13 do is pay for the July group?
- 14 >> Carmen Avalos: We have one
- 15 more meeting coming up on the

- 16 16th and I know we're kind of at
 17 the end of the rope here in
 18 terms of timing on the students
 19 going soon and the question is
 20 Dr. Fierro I will put it back on
 21 you. Is there other funding
 22 sources to utilize to approve
- 23 this tonight for the Tainan
- 24 students and approve a second
- 25 amount for the students in July

- 1 and those going for the
- 2 semester? Again we're at the
- 3 end and basically rushing
- 4 through this again, right, and
- 5 not knowing the parameters of
- 6 the programs that we started
- 7 last year and understanding I
- 8 think now a better understanding
- 9 how the programs work and I
- 10 think that's the other reason
- 11 for going on the trip. We were
- 12 able to visit two universities
- 13 with two programs. This is a
- 14 third program with another

- 15 university all together
- 16 different and so I think as
- 17 Board Members I am certainly
- 18 getting a better happening how
- 19 it's all coming together and how
- 20 we can really truly exploit in a
- 21 positive way the opportunities
- 22 that our students will have. We
- 23 talk about diversity in other
- 24 cultures and bring that back and
- 25 you become better students and

- 1 but also share the opportunities
- 2 with other students because word
- 3 of mouth is how we get a lot of

 - different conversations right in
- the middle of allocating about
- 500 per student counting we were
- 22 going to send 40 but if we are
- moving into covering 100% of the
- cost for 40 students I will say
- you probably want to approve

- this item and then I will have
- to bring you a different item
- with funding identified funding
- for the subsequent trips.
- >> Carmen Avalos: I guess my
- next recommendation as we start
- bringing these items forward I
- think we need to have something
- already in place and goes back
- to you guys in the various folks
- dealing with the program. Maybe

- 12 Dr. Pritchett running this 13 portion of the duties. I suggest that we definitely adopt some kind of a policy for these 15 programs because again you said 17 it; right? This is one program but there are other programs most costly for students who also want to participate and we 20 obviously can't be constantly
- 22 funding. It's not sustainable
- so looking at what we need to
- address moving forward and again
- 25 because this is last minute here

- we are and we need to address
- this now. I don't feel we're in
- the best position and just do

- grow we definitely need a more

- structured policy moving

- >> Dr. Fierro: On the policy
- for instance what is happening
- on the other programs there is
- 8 no expectation that the college

will contribute anything on the other programs and the students 10 start planning nearly a year in 11 12 advance to save and participate in different events and they 14 have to make monthly deposits with a third party in order to be able to buy their ticket and their hotels and so on and 17 obviously that is more expensive than this program and now we 19 have a five year contract my 21 suggestion is we're working with the students traveling next year right now so they can buy their ticket a whole year in advance 25 because it's a great thing that Sample footer

- 1 we're going to do everything we
- 2 can to facilitate their trip it
- 3 is not sustainable for us to
- 4 identify funds of this size
- 5 every year especially if the
- 6 program continues to grow. It

- 7 will become unyielding for us to
 8 identify \$50,000 or more every
 9 year cover the travel and expect
 10 others to then pay for their own
- 11 so what we could do is develop a
- 12 process that allow the students
- 13 to start signing up for the
- 14 program next summer this year
- 15 and come August work with the
- 16 travel agency and every month
- 17 they have go and put 100 or \$50,
- 18 whatever it is until they finish
- 19 paying.
- 20 >> Shin Liu: I agree comments
- 21 and it's learning for students
- 22 too and plan for the trip and
- 23 save some money and also we were
- 24 in Taipei and also talk about
- 25 want to build us some ongoing

- 1 project, allow the student to be
- 2 able contribute to that project
- 3 to get a little money from there
- 4 so that's a learning too for
- 5 them to learn to pay themselves,

- 6 not 100% pay for themselves, but
- 7 we help them in all these way to
- 8 help student to grow too I
- 9 believe.
- 10 >> Carmen Avalos: And too Dr.
- 11 Fierro just knowing that this is
- 12 going to be a program that we're
- 13 going to have for some time now
- 14 -- particularly a minimum of
- 15 five years I am inclined to say
- 16 let's pay for this time around
- 17 and come up with a contract to
- 18 have the students reimburse the
- 19 college in a monthly pavement
- 20 plan if possible to make it --
- 21 payment to plan and make is it
- 22 possible and have the pocket of
- 23 money and utilize to get the
- 24 cheapest tickets and it's not as
- 25 expensive. Right now we're

- 1 paying top dollars for the
- 2 tickets because we're doing it
- 3 at the end but knowing it's

- 4 going to happen in a year in5 advance and even in a group
- 6 basis it's still less expensive
- 7 I think particularly as a group
- 8 pricing so I mean food for
- 9 thought. We're here at end of
- 10 the line in terms of timing so I
- 11 am happy to hear what the other
- 12 Board Members have to say but in
- 13 either case I think we're
- 14 limited on the cases we have
- 15 tonight simply because timing
- 16 and timing.
- 17 >> I think it's important that
- 18 we invest and kind of see this
- 19 as a start up cost to say the
- 20 least because this is such a new
- 21 program and that we're trying to
- 22 increase the longevity of this
- 23 program as long as we're around
- 24 as a college for sure, and so I
- 25 think even though there is some

- 1 issues regarding how to fund
- 2 these students I think the

- 3 priority is to make sure that
- 4 this program is successful and
- 5 that we have the students go
- 6 over there so if it does take a
- 7 little more money out of our
- 8 pocket which in the grand scheme
- 9 of things is not that much. I
- 10 agree with the principle that
- 11 the students do need to have
- 12 skin in the game so you know at
- 13 least if not a monetary
- 14 reimbursement but certainly some
- 15 kind of product they could bring
- 16 back to our campus or at least
- 17 our community in general at
- 18 least to make sure that they can
- 19 perhaps even go around to the
- 20 different high schools or other

- 9 the program with some seniors
- 10 there so that we can help create
- 11 some new recruits for any future
- 12 cohorts of the program, so what
- 13 do other Board Members think of
- 14 that idea? Because again this
- 15 is a start up. This really is a
- 16 relatively new program at least
- 17 in the caliber that it is, so in
- 18 order to have skin in the game
- 19 it doesn't have to be monetary
- 20 for the students to do it. Time
- 21 is the most valuable thing that
- 22 any one of us can give and when
- 23 they give it to Cerritos for all
- 24 the money we paid to go to any
- 25 of these areas it's worth it for

- 1 the student to do that, so how
- 2 does that sound to other Board
- 3 Members?
- 4 >> [Off Mic].
- 5 >> Carmen Avalos: I don't
- 6 think any of us here don't see
- 7 the value in it that will
- 8 disagree. I think the question
- 9 will it go to all three
- 10 programs, just one program and
- 11 have Dr. Fierro come back at the
- 12 May 16 meeting with another
- 13 funding amount for the other two
- 14 programs? Or what exactly I
- 15 think that's the question you
- 16 want answered tonight Dr.
- 17 Fierro, is that correct?
- 18 >> Dr. Fierro: Yeah, a couple
- 19 of questions. Up to what amount
- 20 would you consider sponsoring
- 21 the student ticket in and two,
- 22 if exceed the 25 initial
- 23 thousand I would have to come
- 24 back with another item with
- 25 different source of funding to

- 1 cover that, so the first
- 2 question to answer is how much
- 3 funding per student? Because
- 4 that will help me calculate how
- 5 much we can pay and --
- 6 >> Shin Liu: I think when
- 7 first we calculate with Dr. Gary
- 8 Pritchett and fund the 50% for
- 9 each student 25,000 and about
- 10 50% and the Tainan program and
- 11 didn't -- [INAUDIBLE] and most
- 12 of the student purchase ticket.
- 13 >> So we're excluding that
- 14 program? Is that what you're
- 15 saying?
- 16 >> Shin Liu: 25,000 for
- 17 Taipei and Taipei City.
- 18 >> Got it.
- 19 >> Dr. Fierro: Am I hearing
- 20 correctly that most have
- 21 tickets?
- 22 >> Shin Liu: Most of the
- 23 students purchased the ticket
- 24 and they Emailed us every single

- 1 we need student to purchase
- 2 ticket so even new Taipei and
- 3 most purchase ticket because
- 4 they want that lease so half --
- 5 a lot of students already
- 6 purchase ticket so I think
- 7 25,000 we can run for this year
- 8 sorry if we don't have enough we
- 9 can you know come back --
- 10 >> Dr. Fierro: So I would need
- 11 an amendment to the current item
- 12 to include Taipei City and new
- 13 Taipei.
- 14 >> Shin Liu: Yeah, and if we
- 15 need more money we come back but
- 16 right now I know Tainan program
- 17 most people already buy the
- 18 ticket.
- 19 >> Carmen Avalos: Okay. So
- 20 knowing that I suggest Dr.
- 21 Fierro this amount of money go
- 22 to cover for the June, right,
- 23 the June and the semester which

- 24 starts I want to say at end of
- 25 July, you know support those

- 1 students and if there are
- 2 students that didn't purchase a
- 3 current ticket -- seeps like
- 4 everybody did and find out that
- 5 amount is for students that
- 6 still need help. I don't know
- 7 what that looks like either and
- 8 I don't want to exclude the
- 9 students that need financial
- 10 assistance.
- 11 >> I agree. I think at some
- 12 point it needs to be deferred to
- 13 the committee running this and
- 14 the funding needs to be used
- 15 judiciously and I don't want to
- 16 spend money on things we don't
- 17 need to and if students can
- 18 afford tickets great and I also
- 19 think the point earlier about
- 20 having skin in the game it's
- 21 great to participate in the

- 22 process of putting this thing.
- 23 It's not a free trip. It's not
- 24 a free vacation. It's an actual
- 25 activity they're working towards

- 1 so I would encourage -- I would
- 2 just to defer this to the
- 3 committee organizing.
- 4 >> Carmen Avalos: You can
- 5 figure that out Dr. Fierro and
- 6 look at student files and
- 7 financial aid packets and
- 8 hopefully you can gather a
- 9 better sense of their finances.
- 10 I don't want to be part of that.
- 11 I think we will be as fair as
- 12 possible. I don't have a reason
- 13 to think that and that Shin
- 14 brought up and the majority have
- 15 tickets and it will be amazing
- 16 and well worth the money.
- 17 >> We will push by then and
- 18 what happened we submit a lease
- 19 and when we do that they have to
- 20 have an airline ticket.

- 21 >> Carmen Avalos: Well, I
- 22 guess the motion is to approve
- 23 the amount of money with the
- 24 majority going to the new Taipei
- 25 and Taipei programs and whatever

- 1 money is left to be utilized for
- 2 students in the Tainan program.
- 3 Is that correct?
- 4 >> Yes.
- 5 >> Can I ask a question to
- 6 clarify and funding in the
- 7 amount not to exceed 25,000 for
- 8 Taipei cities and Taipei --.
- 9 >> Carmen Avalos: Order one
- 10 is what? June I am thinking
- 11 June and July and --
- 12 >> Dr. Fierro: The other one
- 13 is Tainan and a couple of
- 14 students that need funding there
- 15 and end of this month and new
- 16 Taipei city and Taipei city.
- 17 >> And the 4300 from the Board
