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Why "Racial-Social Justice"? Racial justice goes beyond "anti-racism". Social Justice goes beyond "equal access". Yet, these laudable processes are not outcomes. Racial-Social Justice Teaching emphasizes pedagogy and content for critical historical consciousness and agency, or human freedom for teachers and learners of all backgrounds. This presentation includes examples of racial-social justice teaching across the curriculum in the humanities, the sciences and social sciences to undo miseducation.

Dr. Joyce E. King holds the Benjamin E. Mays Endowed Chair for Urban Teaching, Learning and Leadership in the Department of Educational Policy Studies in the College of Education and Human Development at Georgia State University. She is an affiliated faculty member in Africana Studies, the Women's and Gender Studies Institute, and the Urban Studies Institute. The most recent of her 9 books are *Heritage Knowledge in the Curriculum: Retrieving an African Episteme* (with E. Swartz) and *We Be Lovin' Black Children: Learning to Be Literate about the African Diaspora* (with G. Boutte, G. Jackson & L.J. King, co-editors). Her 70-plus publications appear in the *Harvard Educational Review*, the *Journal of Negro Education*, *Journal of Black Studies*, *Educational Researcher*, *International Journal of Qualitative Studies in Education*, the *Journal of African American History*, and the *International Journal of African Renaissance Studies*. Dr. King is past president of the American Educational Research Association, a member of the Institute for Food and Development Policy (FoodFirst.org) board of directors, and the National African American Reparations Commission. She was the founding Head of the Department of Ethnic Studies at Mills College and Director of Teacher Education at Santa Clara University for 12 years when she also served on the California State Board of Education's Curriculum Commission. Dr. King received Stanford University's Graduate School of Education Alumni Excellence in Education Award (2018).
