



# Study abroad in TAIWAN

## 3-WEEK PROGRAM INCLUDES

- **Airport transfers:** group airport transportation between designated arrival/departure airport and university housing on the scheduled arrival and departure dates.
- **Accommodation:** shared double-occupancy on campus dormitory with shared restroom.
- **Round-trip transportation** for all excursions (rail fare or private coach).
- **Mandarin** language lessons
- **All meals** or stipend for meal during excursion.
- **An orientation meeting** covering topics such as general acclimation to Taiwan, safety and security issues, cultural differences, travel, money, and cultural activities.
- **Local area walking tour**

February 10, 2025 - submit application for priority consideration

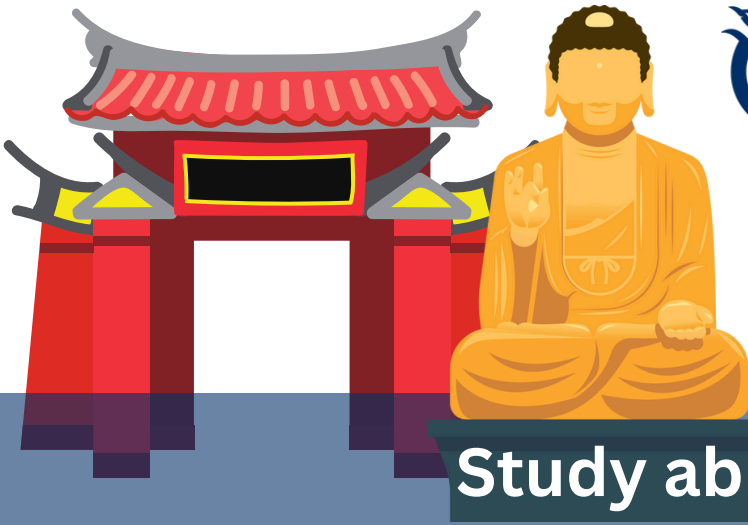
April 3, 2025 - \$800 program fee

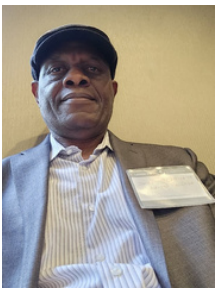

## FACULTY



**Dr. Sunday Obazuaye** has taught political science courses at Cerritos College since 1998. He received his Ph.D. from Claremont Graduate University in California, where he studied comparative politics and public

policy. He teaches courses in American government, comparative government, international relations, global citizenship, model United Nations, and Middle East politics. He is the faculty adviser for the Cerritos College Model United Nations club (CCMUN).

Dr. Obazuaye considers himself a global citizen haven immigrated from Nigeria to the United States in 1980 as an international student. He encourages his students to be globally competent and have a global outlook on life. He is excited and looking forward to engaging his students as they immerse themselves in Taiwanese culture from a global perspective while learning about the political, economic, social, and environmental factors that shape global interactions through the application of political science theories, research methods, and social science concepts.

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## COURSE

Students must enroll in the required Study Abroad Course. This class (Hybrid) will run during the summer session 1 from 05/27 - 7/4/2025, travel from 6/2 - 6/20/2025.

Additional course enrollment is not recommended while studying in Taiwan.

### **POL 255: Global Citizenship**

**3 units**

*Transfer Credit; CSU D.2.; UC Elective*

This course provides an interdisciplinary introduction to global citizenship through the lenses of political science, international relations, and global studies. It explores key theoretical frameworks for understanding global interconnectivity, governance, and citizenship in today's increasingly interconnected world. Students will explore political, economic, social, and environmental factors that shape global interactions through the application of political science theories, research methods, and social science concepts. Through critical examination of contemporary global issues, students will explore ethical dilemmas and the ways individuals and societies address challenges such as migration, inequality, and climate change. By the end of the course, students will evaluate the implications of global citizenship and the rights and responsibilities that accompany the title of global citizen in a globalized world.
