Seeking Economic Justice: Employment Opportunities, Labor Fairness, and Gender Equality



Message from President Dr. José Fierro

Women's History Month is an annual call to recognize and celebrate. It creates a national opportunity to champion the contributions of women within their families, communities, and across society. For thirtyone days, powerful, innovative, dynamic women of all

colors and cultures become a central focus within education and the media. This assists in creating a new narrative within our culture and fosters hope for future generations. Recognition and celebration are only one branch of Women's History Month, however. Honoring past achievement is insufficient alone to spark change in areas of equity and representation. In order for Women's History Month to be transformative, it needs to be as forwardlooking as it is celebratory.

Women's History Month creates an opportunity, a call, for advocacy. Cerritos College knows the power of celebrating women. This is the 30th annual WHM Celebration, and, aptly so, it is focused on transformation—seeing the existing inequities within our society, asking difficult questions, and working for change. This year's theme is Seeking Economic Justice: Employment Opportunities, Labor Fairness, and Gender Equality. During the thirty years Cerritos College has hosted Women's History Month events, the wage gap, employment representation, and division of labor have, in some arenas, improved. However, equity has not yet been achieved, and in some situations, especially for women of color, the improvements since 1986 are minimal.

According to a 2015 brief published by the National Women's Law Center (NWLC), all women receive less pay than their male counterparts; however, African American women receive only 82 cents to the dollar of their White, non-Hispanic female coworkers. Latinas earn merely 73 cents in comparison to their White colleagues. The NWLC explains these differences in three ways: continued discrimination for employees of color; disproportionate numbers of women of color in low-wage/service industry occupations; and staggeringly slow change to the system. These factors are compounded for women who are single parents, the lack of opportunities and support creating barriers to reaching fiscal security or even movement out of national poverty levels. It is poignant that Cerritos College focus its 30th WHM programming on the issue of Economic Justice. As a comprehensive community college, Cerritos College seeks, through education, to open doors to students and open opportunities for life changing learning and skill acquisition. As was true one hundred years ago, when women sought the chance to represent themselves as individuals

legally and politically, so too today are women asking to be seen as individuals: daughters, sisters, mothers, partners who are also learners, workers, wageearners, and community members. In response, we as a college must hear the call for change and seek economic justice through our programming, community efforts, and student support. We must see students as individuals and offer pathways to success that are flexible, timely, and welcoming.

This year's WHM program challenges us to say "we have miles to go", and with eyes open, work as a campus community to strengthen and close the distance between where we are and who we might be, as learners, workers, wageearners, and community members.

Miss Representation (2011; Documentary) exposes how mainstream media and culture contribute to the under-representation of women in positions of power and influence in America. In a society where media is the most persuasive force shaping cultural norms, the collective message we receive is that a woman's value and power lie in her youth, beauty, and sexuality, and not in her capacity as a leader. Stories from teenage girls and provocative interviews with politicians, journalists, entertainers, activists, and academics, like Katie Couric, Rosario Dawson, Gloria Steinem, Margaret Cho, Condoleezza Rice, Rachel Maddow, and Nancy Pelosi, build momentum as Miss Representation accumulates startling facts and statistics that will leave the audience shaken, but armed with a new perspective.

Movie: No Más Bebés

No Más Bebés (2015; Documentary) tells the story of a little-known but landmark event in reproductive justice, when a small group of Mexican immigrant women sued county doctors, the state, and the U.S. government after they were sterilized while giving birth at Los Angeles County-USC Medical Center during the late 1960s and early 1970s. Marginalized and fearful, many of these mothers spoke no English and charged that they had been coerced into tubal ligation having their tubes tied — by doctors during the late stages of labor. Often the procedure was performed after asking the mothers under duress.

Dr. Linda M. Perkins is Associate University Professor and Director of Applied Women's Studies at Claremont Graduate University. She teaches in the departments of Applied Women's Studies, History and Educational Studies. Dr. Perkins is a historian of higher education with an expertise in Black women's educational history as well as the history of Black students in elite institutions of higher education and the history of talent identification programs in higher education. She has published widely in journals such as the Harvard Educational Review, the Journal of Social Issues, the History of Education Quarterly, the Journal of African American History, the Journal of Negro Education. Her book Fanny Jackson Coppin and the Institute for Colored Youth, 1837-1902, was published in 1987.

Dr. Perkins is completing a book manuscript entitled, "The African American Women's Talented Tenth: the History of Black Women's Higher Education from Before the Civil War to 1963". She is on the boards of Re:Gender (formerly the National Council for Research on Women), the Ms. Magazine Board of Scholars, the International Center for Research on Women, and the California African American Museum.

She led the development of education at Hennepin Technical College in Minnesota, and at SCC; as well as the launch of a bachelor's degree program at the College of Southern Nevada.

Dr. Jeffery is very active on professional and community boards: she serves on the CEO Board of the President's Round Table, and on the American Association of Community Colleges (AACC) Special Commission on Structured Pathways. Past involvement on nationwide and regional boards includes her service on the AACC Commission on Academic, Student, and Community Development (ASCD), and the Board of Directors for the California Community College Athletics Association (CCCAA). Dr. Jeffery was also appointed to a U.S. Department of Education task force charged with reviewing the role of technical education.
